## Five Cars In Jam At Landisville Intersection Sun.

One person was hurt slightly when five automobiles jammed together on the new Harrisburg Pike near the Landisville intersection at 6:45 p. m. Sunday.

State Policeman Wm. Devlin had said the injured person, Mrs. Gertrude Nissley of Florin complained of chest pains and was treated for shock by a physician.

She was a passenger in a vehicle driven by her husband, Norman Nissley, fifty-two, Florin that crashed against the rear of a car operated by H. M. Palmer, Ravena, Ohio.

Palmer's car was forced against the vehicle of Gordon E. Kling, thirty-one of Intercourse who was pushed against the rear of a car driven by David K. Bleacher, twenty-two, 226 Juniata St., Lancaster who in turn bumped against a car operated by Elton R. Bomberger, eighteen, 4 East Main St. this boro.

Pvt. Devlin said Bomberger had intended to execute a left turn while traveling east but overshot the Landisville intersection. He accidentally stalled his car and the three other cars all going east were forced to stop behind him. Nissley, police said, could not get stopped in time to avoid causing the telescopic crash.

Damage to Nissley's car was estimated at \$300, to Palmer's 1949 model, \$400, to Kling's \$150 to Bleacher's \$25 and none to Bomberger's police reported.

## 30 a. Annexation At a Standstill; Up To Petitioners

As we mentioned in these columns last week, Mount Joy Boro Council held a special meeting last Thursday for the purpose of considering a request of the supervisors of Mount Joy Township. The point at issue involves a thirty acre tract of land which a majority of the property owners annexed to the Boro.

However, the Township Board of Supervisors notified Council that if the land becomes a part of the boro it will ask remuneration for a \$4800 macadam road recently constructed in the area.

As a result of the township supervisors' action, Council decided to hold up action on the annexation, pending further investigation and discussion.

If and when the land owners can persuade the Supervisors to withdraw their demands, the annexation will be made. Until that time there is little likelihood that anything can or will be done.

James McCormick Cameron, 84, banker and industrialist, died at noon Wednesday at the family home, Donegal Springs, after a long illness.

Born at Lochiel, the family country place between Harrisburg and Steelton, he attended Harrisburg Academy and Phillips Dexter Academy, Exeter, N. H., and received his bachelor's degree from Harvard in 1887.

Surviving are three sisters: Miss Mary Cameron and Mrs. W. H. Bradley, both of Harrisburg; and Mrs. Chandler Hale, Washington D. C.

He was a member of Donegal Society.

## Fire Destroyed Hossler Home At Mastersonville

Fire destroyed the home of Marlin Hossler, Manheim R4 near Mastersonville, last Thursday and left a family of four homeless.

Hossler and his wife and their children Richard, six and Bruce, four, found temporary quarters that night at the home of John K. Shenk a neighbor. Damage to the dwelling is estimated at \$7,500. Fire Chief Richard Myers, Manheim said the fire started in the small frame shed attached to the rear of the dwelling and then had spread through the house. Flames spread slowly at the start and firemen and neighbors were able to save most of the family's clothing and furniture.

Mrs. Hossler told firemen she was cleaning house when she had discovered the fire. She summoned the Manheim and Mt. Joy Fire companies.

Chief Myers said cause of the fire was not determined.

## Gala Hallow'en Parade and Dance On Monday Night

The final arrangements for the Lions Club gala Hallow'en parade and dance, scheduled for Monday, Oct. 31st, are shaping up into quite an event.

The parade will be controlled by James Spangler and the Lion's Club loud speaker system.

The parade, which will form at the Grade School building, will be headed by color guards of the Rotarians, Firemen, Veterans of Foreign Wars, American Legion and other clubs of the town.

The parade route along Main St., will be gaily lighted by a large number of flood lights and hundreds of flares carried by paraders. The remainder of the route will be lighted by extra large street lights and flares.

Forming promptly at 6:30 and moving promptly at 7:00 the parade will move east on Columbia Avenue to Jacob St., north on Jacob to Main; west on Main to New Haven; south on New Haven to Marietta; east on Marietta to Poplar; south on Poplar to the high school where it will disband.
