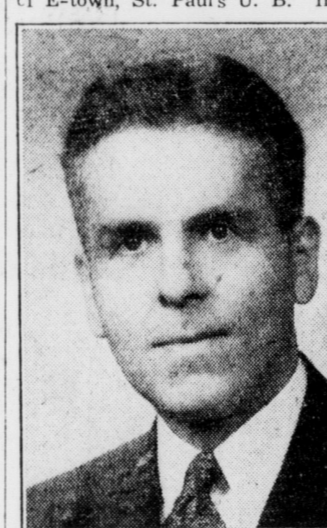

Celebration at Florin Church Closes on Sunday

The Glessbrenner Evan. United Brethren Church at Florin will close the celebration of its 110th Anniversary service with a homecoming service Sunday Oct. 30th at 2:30 p. m. This service will be held out doors at the Florin Town Hall if the weather permits, otherwise it will be held in the Florin E. U. B. Church.
The program for the occasion will consist of several selections by a chorus choir of nearly 200 voices under the direction of Mr. Eugene Saylor, director of music in the East Donegal Twp. Schools. Musical organizations cooperating in this chorus choir include the Glee Club of the Maytown High School and the choirs of the following churches: St. Marks E. U. B. of Mount Joy, Salome E. U. B. of Columbia, St. Paul's E. U. B. of E-town, St. Paul's U. B. from

Mountville and Otterbein E. U. B. of Lancaster. It is anticipated the pastors of several daughter churches will also be present.

The speaker for the historic occasion is Dr. Raymond M. Veh of Harrisburg. Dr. Veh was at one time director of student activities, Pilgrim Foundation at the University of Illinois in Champaign, Ill., former professor and Dean of Men, Evansville, Ind. At the present time Dr. Veh is the editor of the Young Peoples Journal of the E. U. B. denomination called BUILDERS. He is an adult counselor of the General Youth Fellowship of the E. U. B. Church. In Aug. of 1939 Dr. Veh was the official representative of the Evangelical church at the First World Conf. of Christian Youth held at Amsterdam, Holland. In 1948 he was the youth press representative from America at the First Assembly of the new World Council of Churches in Holland.

The numbers by the chorus choir and the message by Dr. Veh will be broadcast by WLAN on Sunday from 7:00 to 7:30 p. m.

Will Honor Musselman
One of the high points in the celebration is the service on Saturday at 7:30 p. m. in honor of the late Dr. John F. Musselman, who gave 39 years of his life to missionary work in Sierra Leone, West Africa. Dr. Musselman was born in Florin. He received his religious training in that church and March 12, 1893 was received into the fellowship of the Florin E. U. B. Church. Later Dr. Musselman transferred his church relations to Covenant E. U. B. Church in Lancaster and it was from that church that he went forth to serve Africa.

The speaker for this occasion is Rev. Solomon Caulker, of Free-town, Sierra Leone British West Africa. Rev. Caulker is a direct product of the work and ministry of Dr. John Musselman. In Africa where Rev. Caulker labors he is the dean of students at the Fourah Bay College in Freetown. Recently at the request of the governor of Sierra Leone he became a member of the following gov't boards: Board of Education; Board of Native Languages; Examiner for Civil Service; Advisory Committee on Development of Higher Education in Sierra Leone; and Advisor Committee for students going abroad for higher education. In the West Africa conference of the E. U. B. Church he serves on the Council of Administration, Judicial committee or Board of Christian Education and the Commission on Evangelism.

Rev. Caulker is a graduate of Lebanon Valley College and Bonebrake Theological Seminary Dayton, Ohio. He took graduate work at University of Chicago.

Heating cable will prevent freezing in spouting, important in supplying cistern water. It also eliminates the icicle hazards.

KEEP DRIVEWAYS AND WALKWAYS FREE OF ICE
Driveways, steps and walkways can be kept free of snow and ice with underground electric heating cable. In new construction, imbed cable in concrete walks, steps and aprons.

MELTING CONGEALED LIQUIDS
Heating cable is also used for melting cold-stiffened liquids. A few turns of cable around the container quickly provides summer-time consistency.
