35 ft. long. The basement will be used as an assembly room and auditorium and will also contain a kitchen. The first and second floors will be used as class room for the nursery, beginners, primary, junior and intermediate departments of the Sunday School.

The present Sunday School room of the church is also to be completely renovated and used for the Sunday School purposes.

During the month of August the Church auditorium was renovated. This included repairs to the plastering, repainting the walls and furniture and sanding the floors.

Upon the completion of the Parish House further improvements to the church's property are planned. The frame structure on the corner of West Main and Manheim streets is to be razed and the entire corner plot of ground is to be landscaped. The estimate cost of the new structure is \$55,000.00. Mr. E. R. Noll, Landisville is the contractor and the Rev. E. A. Lebo, pastor of St. Paul's Lutheran Church is the architectural advisor.

Week's Best Recipe

Oyster Mushroom Pie: 1 c sliced mushrooms, 1-3 c butter, 1-3 c flour, 2c milk, 1-2 c oyster liquor, 1 pt. oysters, 1-2 t salt, pastry. Cook mushrooms in butter for 3 minutes. Stir in flour and when smoothly blended, gradually add milk and oyster liquor. Bring to boiling point, stirring constantly and cook until smooth. Add the oysters and seasoning and turn into a baking dish. Top with pastry, cutting gashes to allow for escape of steam. Bake at 450 degrees 15 to 20 minutes.

Make Ready:
What is more fragrant or more

joyfully awaited in the early spring, than the lily-of-the-valley? And, as a rule, we neglect the beds of these beauties, watching them grow each spring and forgetting about them by fall. It is not too late to lift the clumps and prepare the soil by adding a well-rotted manure or leaf-mold and a complete fertilizer before replanting the hardiest crowns. Set them three inches apart each way. You will have an increase of blooms next spring.

Take A Hint:

Sprinkle wax paper with powdered sugar first before wrapping a cake in it so the frosting of the cake won't stick to the paper. A shiny shell denotes an old egg, so watch carefully when breaking the shell. An angel cake tin need not be greased. Bread crumbs brown more quickly than
