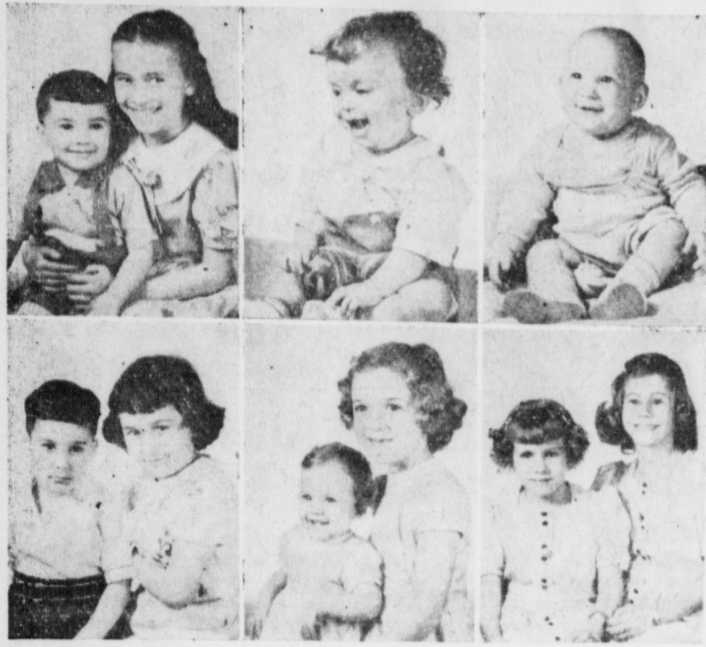

## HEALTH HINTS FOR LIVESTOCK

**HOW TO PREVENT CHOLERA LOSSES**

Hog cholera costs American swine producers at least 20,000,000 dollars a year, according to good authorities. Because the virus can be carried great distances in a great many different ways, it often strikes without warning. And once a hog or herd is infected, there is no cure.

Yet all this loss could be prevented if every hog raiser took advantage of a protective measure developed by veterinary scientists over 30 years ago.

This measure is vaccination by the double immunization method. The pig is inoculated simultaneously with both serum and virus. The resulting immunity from cholera usually lasts for the rest of the pig's life.

Authorities have pointed out a number of reasons why swine owners should have the vaccination done by a veterinarian. It is important that the pigs be examined, first, to see if they are in good enough health to receive the
