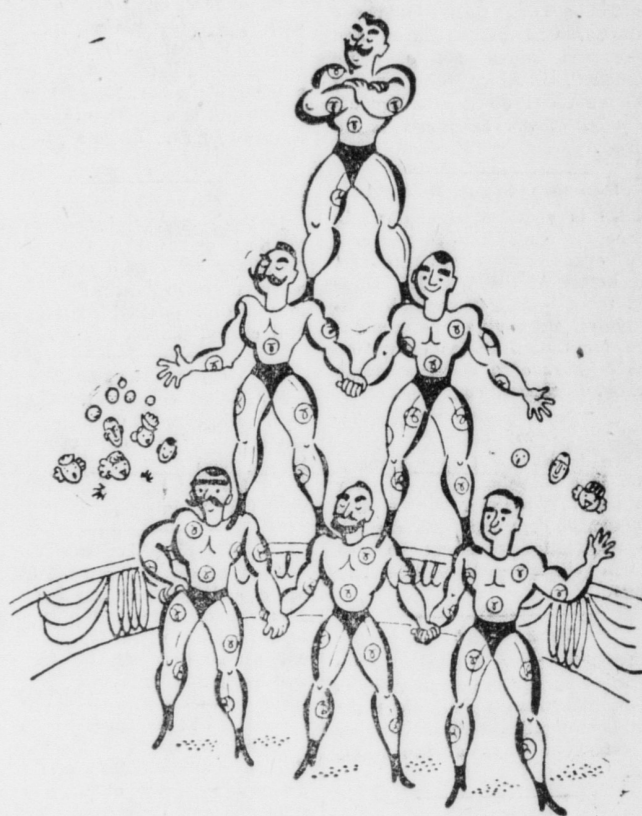

South Market Street and High St., bounded on South by Donegal St., part of Market and Delta Street, Oak Alley, Columbia Ave., Delta St. East Donegal from B. residence to Business. Recommend grass plots on sidewalks 3 ft. maximum width inside curb, be permitted which has 4 ft. minimum width to building line, all residents A & B districts.

Council passed an ordinance which eliminates Trailers occupying A & B districts and imposed a penalty for the violation with the Zoning Board.

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AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND THE ZONING ORDINANCE OF THE BOROUGH OF MOUNT JOY APPROVED JULY 1, 1946, BY ADDING PROVISIONS CONCERNING TRAILERS, AND WATER AND SANITARY REQUIREMENTS FOR DWELLINGS; ELIMINATING CERTAIN FRONTAGE REQUIREMENTS, AND IMPOSING PENALTIES. IT IS HEREBY ORDAINED BY THE BOROUGH COUNCIL, OF THE BOROUGH OF MOUNT JOY, LANCASTER COUNTY, PENNSYLVANIA, AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. The zoning ordinance of the said Borough, entitled "An Ordinance to Divide the Borough of Mount Joy into Districts or Zones, and to Regulate and Restrict there-in the Location, Use, Height, Bulk, and Density of Buildings and other Structures, and the Use of Land", approved July 1, 1946, is hereby amended as follows:

Section 2. The following paragraph is added to Section IV of said ordinance:

DWELLING RESIDENCES; TRAILER. The terms dwelling and residence, and all references to buildings and other structures used for dwelling purposes shall include and apply to trailers, and any other vehicles used for dwelling purposes. Except as herein otherwise expressly provided, every trailer used for dwelling purposes, and the lot on which it is located shall be subject to the several provisions of this ordinance in the same manner and to the same extent as though such trailer or other vehicle were a permanently constructed building. Provided, however, that zoning permits shall not be required for trailers, (but occupancy permits are required as hereinafter provided); and provided, further, that no part of this ordinance shall apply to a transient or temporary location and use of a dwelling trailer in the Borough for a period or periods not exceeding twelve months period.

Section 3. Section V, sub-section (a) of the said ordinance is hereby amended to read as follows:

(a) Use: In Residence "A" Districts no land shall be used, and no building or structure shall be used or erected or altered to be used, for any purpose other than that of a single-family residence and its accessory uses and buildings, a church school, public park or playground, private club or recreation area not operated for profit, some form of agriculture or horticulture other than keeping hogs, and the commercial keeping or handling of farm stock or poultry, the sale of farm products produced on the property where offered for sale, and special uses as provided by paragraphs (a), (b), and (c) of Section IX. Provided, however, that no trailer or other vehicle used for dwelling purposes shall be located in a Residence "A" District.

Section 4. Section VI, sub-section (a) of the said ordinance is hereby amended to read as follows:

(a) Use: Uses permitted in Residence "B" Districts shall be the same as those permitted in Residence "A" Districts except that two-family and multiple-family dwellings and boarding houses and tourist houses shall be permissible in the "B" Districts. Provided, however, that no trailer or other vehicle used for dwelling purposes shall be located in a Residence "B" District.

Section 5. Section IX, sub-section (k) of said ordinance is hereby amended to read as follows:

(k) DWELLING WATER AND SANITARY REQUIREMENTS: Every dwelling or residence must have within itself or on its own lot, its own water supply or connections, and its own toilet and drainage facilities. When and as a sewerage system is constructed in the Borough, every dwelling or residence to which such system is available for use must have its own sewer connection thereto, and shall not discharge sanitary sewage except into such sewerage system. The requirements of this sub-section shall be in addition to and not in derogation of any other ordinance, law, or regulation prescribing additional or other water and sanitary requirements.

Section 6. Section X, Sub-section (d) of said ordinance is hereby amended to read as follows:

(d) OCCUPANCY PERMITS: No building hereafter constructed, erected or altered, under a zoning permit, and no dwelling trailer or other dwelling vehicle, shall be occupied or used in whole or in part for any use whatsoever, and no change of use of any building or part of building shall hereafter be made until an Occupancy Permit has been issued by the Zoning Officer, indicating that the building or use complies with the provisions of this ordinance. An occupancy permit shall be granted or denied within 10 days of date of written application therefor.

Section 7. Section X, Sub-section (h) of the said ordinance is hereby amended to read as follows:

(h) REMEDIES AND ENFORCEMENT: Any person, whether owner or tenant, who shall erect, construct, reconstruct, alter, repair, convert, maintain, or use any building, structure (including trailer or other vehicle) or premises without first having obtained a zoning permit or an occupancy permit as required by this ordinance, or in violation of any other provision of this ordinance, or of any regulation duly made hereunder, or, shall permit any such violation on premises owned or occupied by him, and shall not have abated such violation within thirty days after notice from the Zoning Board of Adjustment or, Borough Council to do so, upon conviction thereof in a summary proceeding, shall pay a fine of not less than \$5.00 or more than \$100.00 for each violation, to be collected as penalties are collected, together with the costs of prosecution; and every day during the service of said notice after which such violation continues shall

be a separate offense. In addition to any other remedies, the Borough of Mount Joy, or the Burgess of the Borough, or any residents of the Borough, may also institute any appropriate action or proceeding to prevent such unlawful erection, construction, reconstruction, alteration, repair, conversion, or use, to restrain, correct, or abate such violation, to prevent or enjoin the occupancy of said building, structure, or land, or to prevent any other illegal act, conduct, business or use in or about such premises.

Enacted and ordained this 7 day of November, A. D. 1949, after having first been submitted to the Borough Planning Board more than thirty days prior to said enactment.

A RESOLUTION SUSPENDING EFFECTIVE DATE OF ORDINANCE WHEREAS, on October 3, 1949 the Borough Council of Mount Joy, passed an ordinance annexing to the Borough certain land now situated in Mount Joy Township, as the result of a petition of a majority of the freeholders of the said territory. And an unanticipated claim has been asserted by the Board of Supervisors of Mount Joy Township for adjustment of indebtedness of the said Township because of said proposed annexation.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Borough Council of the Borough of Mount Joy, Lancaster County, Pa., that the Borough Secretary be, and hereby is directed not to advertise said ordinance nor to certify the same to the Court of Quarter Sessions of Lancaster County until said claim has been satisfactorily adjusted between the Township of Mount Joy and the petitioners for said annexation, and release of all claims against the Borough of Mount Joy or other satisfactory arrangement with Borough of Mount Joy shall have been effected with respect to the said claim, or any other claim which said Township has or might have by reason of the said proposed annexation, so that said ordinance shall not become effective until such settlement has been effected.
