### Proper Insulation Helps Poultrymen

#### Benefits From Practice Extend to All Animals

Farmers pay for 900,000 tons of chicken feed annually that they could save by properly insulating poultry houses.

That figure is reached by projecting results of tests conducted at Iowa state college, in which flocks living in insulated dwellings required 15 per cent less feed. The protected flocks laid more eggs, and fatalities were fewer.

Benefits from insulation extend to all farm animals. Hog house insulation, for example, makes possible earlier litters, increases hog production, and lowers feed costs.

Only through proper insulation can such results be accomplished. In recent years an insulating material capable of such results has gained wide acceptance among

farmers. Known as Zonolite vermiculite, it is completely inorganic, unburnable, and easily used as a lightweight plaster or concrete aggregate, or as insulating fill. Zonolite, a mineral of the mica family, weighs only about one-sixteenth as much as sand.

Perhaps its most important benefit is that it keeps the farm building warm and dry, and enables the ventilating equipment to work more efficiently. Here's how it functions in a hen house:

When outside temperature drops to zero, the heat given off by the birds might keep the interior at about 25 degrees. Unfortunately, the chickens also contribute moisture to the air. At low temperatures, air cannot hold a great deal of moisture.

If the insulation is used to keep the inside temperature at 50 degrees, considerably more water will be removed. It is a fact that air at 50 degrees will hold six times as much moisture as air at 25 degrees and will take that amount with it when removed from the building by the ventilation system.

### Speeds Harvest



With another multi-million bushel corn harvest expected this fall, America's farmers are turning more and more to machinery to prepare the crop for use.

One improved machine (shown above) made by the New Holland machine company shells up to three and one-third bushels of corn each minute. This machine takes in ears of corn and seconds later ejects cobs in one direction and cleaned shelled corn in another. The shelled corn is either bagged or elevated into a wagon automatically.

### Leaving Straw to Rot Costly to Dairy Men

Leaving straw to rot in the fields will get a farmer as much for his money as lighting a pipe with a 10-dollar bill.

Ivan H. Loughery, dairy specialist of the Wyoming agricultural extension service, says: "Use that straw for bedding down your dairy cows, and especially since the bedding problem always becomes acute during the winter months." He adds that straw is costly.

### Paper Survey

Data based on a world survey of approximately 80 paper-consuming countries, exclusive of Russia, shows that the United States is by far the largest producer, importer and consumer of paper and board in the world. The study further shows that production of paper and board in the United States and Canada has increased 11,000,000 tons since 1937, in Latin America 330,000 tons and in Australia 115,000 tons. Europe and Asia lost production, while Africa and the Near East made minor gains since 1937.

### Drive Carefully

Drive slower on snow or slippery pavements than you think necessary for absolute safety; ten miles an hour is frequently the maximum safe speed. Always be alert for pedestrians or for children on sleds; remember that you may be powerless to stop your car in a short distance. Avoid the need for sudden stops; you may slide.

### Poison Ivy

Poison ivy produces quite large clusters of round white fruits about a quarter of an inch in diameter. These are borne on low stubby bushes a foot or two high. You can always identify poison ivy by its characteristic three-leaf structure. Three leaves in a cluster mean trouble.

### For New Room Beauty

An interesting and beautiful decorative effect can be achieved by using two tones of the same color for the walls of a room. Use the lighter tint on the window walls—which are always the darkest, anyway—and paint the other walls in the deeper color.

### Feed Grains

Production of feed grains in 1949 was estimated at 128 million tons, a total second only to 1948's 137 million tons. With a large carry-over, 1949's production of feed grains brings total feed supplies on farms to the largest ever available, both in total volume and in quantity per animal unit.

### Potato Diseases

Until recently, potato diseases were of only minor importance to Alaskan farmers. Now, however, some of the diseases have become so severe that many farmers have decided to discontinue potato growing.

### Tests for Furniture

JAN. 31ST DEADLINE FOR FARMERS TO FILE TAX RETURN. Farmers have until January 31, 1950, to file their estimated income tax return, or the completed return, instead of January 15, as in former years.

They may either file the estimated return or the completed return with full payment by January 31st. If they file only the estimated return they must file the completed return by March 25.

This is the only major change in the 1949 income tax regulations.

### REMOVE MILKSTONE

### Sequoia Trees Found in Penna.

Sequoia trees are growing in Pa. The Department of Forests and Waters revealed today.

Ordinarily associated with the State of California and the American West Coast, the giant Sequoia (Sequoia Gigantia) has apparently found fertile soil and favorable conditions for its growth in this State.

Seeds of them have been reported to the Department of Forests and Waters. Most of the trees are in a healthy, thriving condition.

However, don't expect to drive through a tunnel hewn from the leaf of one of these forest giants as California travel folders show. Pa. Sequoias are just junior editions of their western brothers.

The largest Sequoia growing in our State, District said is located about three miles northwest of Lima in Delaware County not far from Philadelphia.

Planted sometime between 1825 and 1850, this tree is now 48 feet high and nearly three feet in the diameter, four feet above the ground. Its bark is three inches thick, foresters report.
