**Introduction of Heels**

Before the 16th century, shoes for men and women alike were made of a worn-out dime. The early beginning of what today is standard equipment for the well-dressed woman, occurred in France nearly 400 years ago, when Catherine de Medici, bride of Henry II, first introduced heels to the world. They were about an inch high and regarded as the last word in elegance—especially when painted red.

**Preparation of Steaks**

A one-inch steak, well-done, should be cooked seven minutes on each side. A one-inch steak cooked rare takes five minutes for each side. Steaks one and one-half inches thick take nine minutes, rare, and 12 minutes, well-done, on each side. Two-inch thick steaks should be cooked 10 minutes on each side, rare, and 20 minutes on each side, well done.

**Fourth of July**

Most Americans recognize the Fourth of July as a celebration marking the signing of the Declaration of Independence. But the Fourth of July also commemorates the death of two great patriots—Thomas Jefferson, who wrote the Declaration, and John Adams, a staunch supporter and one of the signers. Both these men died on July 4, 1826.

**British Imports**

**World Mapping**
