Robert C. Rosser Buys The Schroll Plot At Chickies

This week Mr. Robert C. Rosser, of the Rosser Construction Co. General Contractors, purchased at private sale and on private terms, a plot of ground along the approach to the American Legion Home at Chickies in Rapho Township.

Mr. Rosser is extensively engaged in road construction work throughout the state and with an office on East Main Street, here, will use the above plot for storing and repairing his entire equipment.

He contemplates making marked improvements there. The rock bank along a portion of the front will be removed, the entire plot graded and a large steel building in which to store and repair equipment will be erected immediately.

The new owner took immediate possession and will move all his heavy equipment used on a road building job a short distance south of Jersey Shore, to the location here.

In March, 1947, Mr. Schroll purchased this plot, then an old quarry and dumping ground contemplating improving same. His plans were changed when the State acquired a portion for the new 4-laner.

The Visiting Nurse Association of Lancaster County held their annual meeting on Wednesday, Jan. 11th at which time the annual reports of the nurses were read.

The annual report of Mrs. Ruth B. Walters, R. N., visiting nurse for the Etown, Mount Joy and Manheim District, was submitted as follows, a total of 1500 visits was made to 158 patients.

A total of 1065 visits were made to 90 community patients of which 882 were full pay, 2 visits were part pay and 171 visits were free visits which included 118 organization or educational visits.

The greater part of the bedside nursing done by the Visiting nurse has been to the aged and chronically ill patients who can be given care in their homes.
