

E'town Man Was Killed By An Auto Near Rheems Sat.

Abc Hashem, well known resident of Elizabethtown, was killed when struck by an automobile on Highway Route 230 near Rheems Saturday evening.

Dr. J. Hoffman Garber, deputy coroner, Elizabethtown, said the pedestrian died instantly of a skull fracture. He also suffered compound fractures of both ankles.

State Policeman Wm. J. Devlin said the accident occurred at eight p. m. Saturday and identified the driver of the car as Clarence S. Stauffer, twenty-eight, Manheim 1.

Stauffer, police said, was driving east and the man was crossing from north to south when he was hit and thrown 125 feet. He was pronounced dead at the accident scene by Dr. Stuart C. Smith, who responded with the Elizabethtown Community ambulance.

A witness to the crash, Levi Muma, Elizabethtown R1, told police he saw the accident from a nearby diner and told police Hashem ran onto the road into the left front fender of the vehicle.

Hashem known to townspeople as "Abe", operated a shoe repair shop on South Market Street in E'town for many years and at the time of his death was employed by the Savoy Shoe Co., E'town. A member of St. Peter's Catholic Church of E'town, he is survived by his wife Sadie; a son Alexander, both of E'town; a daughter, Mrs. Mary Elizabeth Elder, Harrisburg; a brother, Marshall, Seibeltown and two sisters, Mrs. Elizabeth Shiban and Mrs. Rose Gandour, both of Chester and one grandchild.
