on real estate, the same as for 1949 and an \$8 head tax—\$2 less than last year.

Council also agreed to advertise bids on the following: purchase of a two-ton truck and repairs of the macadam-surfaced tennis courts in the boro park.

Council also authorized the purchase of a new adding machine. A state inspector gave a "safe and sanitary condition" OK to our borough lock up.

The following checks were received by Council: Ellis Fellenbaum \$68.67 for 1946 taxes collected; Robert Brown, justice of the peace, \$5. fines; Christ Walters, \$2.50 building permits for February; James Hockenbery, \$420.00 February auto violations, \$126.00 of 1948 taxes collected with an outstanding balance of \$1,829.16 and \$843.16 of 1949 taxes collected with an outstanding balance of \$4,937.88; Burgess Zerphey \$120.00 parking fines, \$12.00 peddlers' fees.

Zerphey also reported the return to active duty of Chief of Police Park Neiss whose report showed 11 auto violations and 3 accidents investigated and 522 miles travelled by auto.

A quotation of \$255.00 was received on the automatic sprinkler system for the fire house, but no action was taken.

Street committee reported the traffic lights will be installed within the next 50 days.

Supervisor Smeltzer was ordered to remove a fire plug near the Roy Hoffman home.

All bills were approved by the finance committee: Boro \$2,497.38, Water \$524.85, Patterson coal fund \$112.6.

A pump at the water works was reported repaired. Pumping engineer Schatz pumped 8,048,000 gallons in 456 hours.

Fire chief Myers reported all trucks in working order and six calls answered in February.

Prior to changing certain Zones in the boro, as suggested by the Planning and Zoning Committee, a public meeting will be held in the council room on April 3 at 7:00 p. m.

President of Council, Robert Keller and Paul Stehman were absent from the meeting. Lester Hostetter acted as temporary chairman.
