High School won Opener With 19 Runs On 13 Hits

The Mount Joy High School baseball team opened its regular league season with an impressive 19 to 5 win over East Hempfield.

The Ram nine broke into the scoring in their half of the third. Brown popped up to Shertzer, Wilson got a base on hits, stole second and moved to third when Shertzer booted Kears' grounder to third. Kears stole second and Shupp fled out to Stehman in center field. Kears moved to third and Wilson scored on the play. Koser fled out to Stehman to end the inning.

The Ram nine really found the range in the fourth when they scored eight runs on five hits to go ahead 9 to 0. Krall was removed and Grady took the hill for East Hempfield to retire the side.

Wilson opened the fifth with a triple starting another big inning for the proteges of Coach Day. Kears got on as Habecker misjudged his fly to right field, Wilson scoring and Kears moving to second on the play at the plate. Shupp singled scoring Kears. Shupp was thrown out stealing second and Koser drew a walk. George McCue hit a home run to make the score 13-0. Bowman drew a walk, Stehman relieved Krady and hit Harple the next batter, moving Bowman to second, Miller attempted to bunt and missed, Bowman stole third on the play and Harple moved to second.
