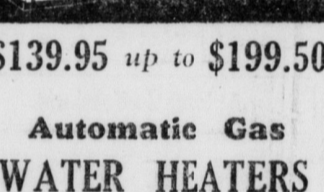
An invitation has been sent to George McCue to be the guest at the banquet. Georgie has been selected as the outstanding athlete of Mount Joy high school and will receive the award.
