LARGE HOUSE AT LANDISVILLE MOVED A CITY BLOCK

Just what can be accomplished nowadays with all the modern equipment was demonstrated at Landisville on Tuesday.

One of the oldest houses in the village was moved to a new location to make way for a new First National Bank Building.

Best available records show that the house was one of two dwellings standing in the town in 1874. Originally, it was a log cabin but near the turn of the century, the late J. N. Summy covered the logs with weather boarding and built an addition.

In 1946, the property along with a barn, was purchased by the First National Bank for future expansion. Recently the barn and dwelling were sold to C. C. Krouse, of Columbia. The house is unoccupied at the present time.

Monday the barn was moved and Tuesday the dwelling was placed on wheels and slowly moved to its new foundation about 200 feet from the old site.

The students reported that thus far they have learned to write articles, proof read, spell better, learn their grammar better and learned to use the mimeographing machine.

Week's Best Recipe:

Fig Bars: 1 c dried figs, 1 1/2 c sifted enriched flour, 1/2 t baking powder, 1/2 t soda, 1/2 t salt, 2 eggs, separated, 1 c sugar, 1 t vanilla, 1/2 c buttermilk or sour milk, 1/2 cup chopped nuts. Pour boiling water over figs and let stand 10 minutes. Drain. Cut off stems. Cut figs in small pieces. Sift together flour, baking powder, soda and salt. Beat egg yolk. Add sugar gradually, beating until light, then add vanilla. Add flour mixture to egg mixture alternately with buttermilk or sour milk. Fold in figs and nuts. Fold in stiffly beaten egg whites. Spread in greased pan. Bake in moderate oven 25 minutes. Cut in bars. Makes 4 dozen bars, 2x1 inches.

Feather-bedding scheme of Firemen's Union to put an additional fireman on diesel locomotives has been

Now the Firemen's leaders seek to paralyze railroad transportation to compel the railroads to employ a wholly unnecessary additional fireman to ride on diesel locomotives. This scheme is plain

FEATHER-BEDDING!

LEADERS of the Firemen's union have called a nationwide strike starting with four great railroads on April 26. These railroads are the New York Central, Pennsylvania, Santa Fe, and Southern.

The union claim that a second fireman is needed on grounds of safety is sheer hypocrisy. Safety has been dragged into this dispute only in an unsuccessful effort to give a cloak of respectability to vicious feather-bedding demands.

After a careful study of the first demands of this union, a Presidential Fact Finding Board on May 21, 1943, reported to President Roosevelt that there was no need for an extra fireman on diesel locomotives.

Again, on September 19, 1949, after a second hearing on the union leaders' demands, a second Board reported to President Truman that: "There presently exists no need for an additional fireman . . . upon either the ground of safety or that of efficiency and economy of operation."

Safety Record of Diesels is Outstandingly Good

Although the railroads accepted the Board findings, the union leaders have brazenly rejected them. They represent that an extra fireman is needed for "safety" reasons. Here's what the Board had to say on that point:

"The safety and on-time performance of diesel electric locomotives operated under current rules have been notably good . . .

"Upon careful analysis of the data submitted on safety, we have concluded that no valid reasons have been shown as a support for the Brotherhood proposal under which a fireman would be required to be at all times continuously in the cab of road diesels. The proposal must be rejected."

The real reason behind these demands is that the union leaders are trying to make jobs where there is no work. In other words, a plain case of "feather-bedding."

The railroads have no intention of yielding to these wasteful make-work demands.
