High School Band And Scout Patrol To Parade May 6

The Annual Parade and Rally of the School Safety Patrols of Lancaster City and County will be held in Lancaster on Saturday morning, May 6. More than 3,000 children—all of them Patrol members and their hands—will take part in this big demonstration, the largest and most colorful of its kind ever held in Pennsylvania and one of the largest in the nation.

As in previous years, the parade and rally will be sponsored by the Lancaster Automobile Club, with the co-operation of Pennsylvania State Police, Lancaster Police and the school authorities.

The parade will move on a route laid out through downtown Lancaster, then to Williamson Field of Franklin and Marshall College where an elaborate program will be staged. This will include music five acts from the annual State Police rodeo and brief talks by visiting nobles. This program will be open to the public without charge.

The Mount Joy Patrol and the High School Band will be in this parade.

A score of other school bands will march in the parade. More than 100 juvenile safety floats will be entered. Substantial cash prizes will be given by the Automobile Club for outstanding parade features.

For ten consecutive years—up to and including 1942—a Patrol parade and rally was held in Lancaster each Spring. During the war it was discontinued, but was revived in 1948, bigger than ever before.

A half-hour-long colored motion picture of last year's parade and rally has been shown to more than 30,000 in the schools this year. Motion pictures of the 1950 event will be taken for presentation in the schools next year.

Arrangements for the parade and rally are in charge of Sgt. H. A. Ries of the State Police, Sgt. John E. Ehler of the Lancaster Police and Dean Gable of the Automobile Club.

P.P. & L. Stockholders Hear Report Of Rising Electric Use In Penna.

At annual meeting of Pennsylvania Power & Light stockholders at Allentown Monday, Chas. E. Oakes, Company President, reported continuing rise in customer requirements for electric power. As a result of this expanding business, Mr. Oakes foresaw possibility of "a more liberal policy in connection with dividends on common stock in the near future."

Reviewing last year's business, the utility president said revenue had improved slightly more than 5 per cent over the previous year but that many items of expenses still continued upward. He was optimistic about 1950 on the basis of first quarter showing, in which kilowatt hours showed a better than 3 per cent rise over the same quarter in 1949.

The company's construction program to meet increased electric requirements of the more than a half-million customers was moving ahead very satisfactorily he said. This program is high-lighted by the completion of the first 150,000 kilowatts of capacity in the late fall, at the highly efficient new Sumbury Plant. The new 100,000 kilowatt addition is well under way. The construction budget for 1950 was announced as 28.6 million dollars, with the overall program for the three years, ending 1952, expected to be 61.5 million dollars. Mr. Oakes said \$8,000,000.00 of the new money required had already been secured through the sale of bonds and that over the three year period \$18,000,000.00 more would have to be raised through the sale of securities to carry out the 60.5 million dollar program.

The company's directors were re-elected and the stockholders authorized the management to increase the authorized capital stock by 100,000 additional shares of series preferred and 12,000 additional shares of 4 1/2 per cent preferred. Directors of the company are: D. H. Brillhart,
