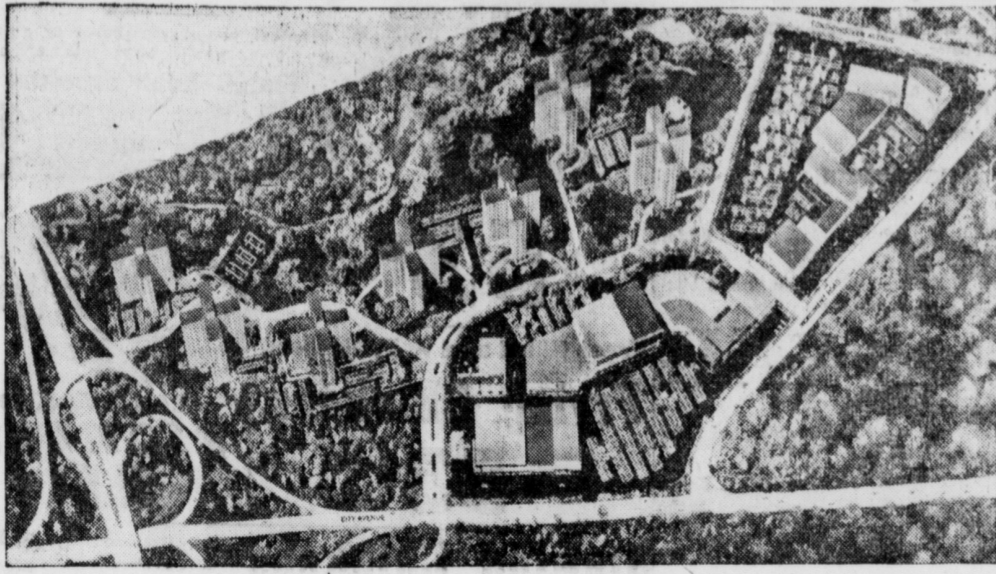


Modern New Residential and Shopping Community Now Under Construction
