### EASTERN END OF TURNPIKE TO BE COMPLETED OCTOBER 1

The 100-mile eastern extension of the Pennsylvania Turnpike from Middlesex to King-of-Prussia is scheduled to be completed October 1st, it was announced over the week-end by Thomas J. Evans, chairman of the Turnpike Commission.

The Lancaster, Dauphin and Lebanon County sections of the highway are scheduled to be completed about July 20. The new bridge over the Susquehanna River, south of Harrisburg is scheduled to be finished about the same time.

The Commission found that three contracts, totaling 12.6 miles of the road in parts of Lancaster, Dauphin and Lebanon Counties are nearest to completion.

The housing ceremony followed one of the largest parades in the town's history, led by mounted horsemen and including cars transporting speakers, county fire officials and honored guests: American Legion marching unit, Mt. Joy; E. Hemphill Twp. High School band, Landisville; Landisville firemen's marching unit, bicycle brigade and two units of apparatus; marchers representing Ironville Fire Company; Mt. Joy High School Band, Friendship Fire Company marching group; marching outfit of the East Petersburg Fire Company, apparatus of the Marietta T. C. Depot, musical and marching units and apparatus of the Hope Fire Engine Company and Community Band of Manheim; apparatus and marchers from Rohrerstown and Silver Spring Fire Companies; Shawnee Fire Co. Band of Columbia, marching organizations of the Salunga Fire Co. and Ladies, Auxiliary, car with company officers, honor car for Robert M. Brubaker, old and new units of Salunga apparatus; marchers of the Junior Buffs and a group of floats representing business establishments of the area.

In addition to Bailey's address during the post-parade exercises, other program attractions were: address of welcome, Walter Eshelman, company president; musical selections, East Hemphill High School Band; History of Salunga Fire Co., Simon H. Hiestand, and presentation of a check for \$1,000 to Brubaker as a gift of appreciation from fellow firemen, made by Wilbur C. Hiestand, local fire chief. Hiestand presided as master of ceremonies.

Also honored during the ceremony were: Dr. Jerome Kendig, a trustee of the company since its incorporation and a physician in the 61 years; Ira M. Herr, the company's first fire chief in 1910; N. N. Bear, vice president when the company was organized; E. G. Myers and S. H. Hiestand, original charter members; Lester Good of Landisville, Earl Lefever of Quarryville, and Paul Knier of Manheim, officials of the county firemen's association.

The new pump, housed officially by neighboring Landisville firemen, was custom-built in 17 months by Brubaker and members of the company.
