NEW 66,000 VOLT SUBSTATION BY PW&P NEAR HOLTWOOD

A long delayed \$1,000,000 step in Pennsylvania's post-war electric power expansion was announced today by the Penna. Water & Power Company, which will erect a new 66,000 volt substation near its Holtwood hydro and steam generating plants. The new unit will be known as the Martie Substation.

Greater reliability of service to its customers, particularly those in the Lancaster, York and Coatesville areas, rather than increased power supply is the object of the new construction. Company officials said. The new Substation will furnish additional modern transmission facilities for the growing "pool" of electrical energy required by the ever-increasing demands of the several electric utility companies serving the southeastern area of the state.

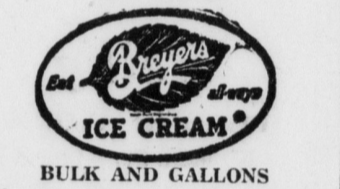
