HARRISBURG PIKE DETOUR PLANNED AT MIDDLETOWN

Harrisburg Pike traffic is being detoured around Middletown since Monday to permit construction of a four-lane concrete highway thru the borough. U. S. Routes 322-422 will carry a detour from Harrisburg to Hummelstown, thence over U. S. 322 to Hockersville and south on Route 340 to Elizabethtown.
