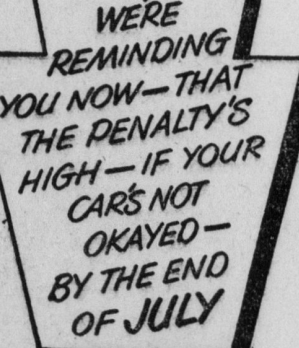

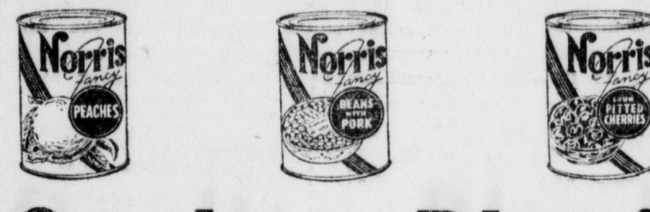
TALENTED COMEDIAN IN GREINA CAST
