Edward J. Myers, sixty, welldriller, killed himself in the bedroom of his home at Salunga, about 4 p. m. Monday, with a high-powered deer rifle.

Members of the family heard the shot and found Mr. Myers' body in the bedroom, summoned Dr. Joseph C. Gilbert, Landisville deputy coroner, who pronounced him dead and issued a verdict of suicide. Dr. Gilbert, said the bullet entered the left side of his head.

According to the family, Mr. Myers had been in ill health for ometime




