outlay of \$30,000 for the purchase of additional grounds.
The over-all plan calls for a 20-room addition to the high school in Manheim Borough, which will become a junior-senior high school, and the construction of four elementary school buildings in the rural areas.

This will bring about the closing of 13 one-room buildings in Penn Township, and 14 one-room and two-room buildings in Rapho Township. Each of the proposed new rural buildings will be situated in such a way that it will be not more than 4.8 miles from the most distant of the present one-room schools in its area.

The present board of 15 members gradually will be reduced until it becomes a seven-man board. This will take until 1955.
