the school preparing them for it? Secondly, in a larger school we would have more teachers. As a result, the classes would be smaller. This would benefit both the teacher and the student. Also, the teacher would be able to teach the subject in which he specialized, thus doing a more efficient job with less effort. Thirdly, in a larger school there would be more and better equipment because the school would be able to finance it. For example, separate classrooms and study halls could be had. In our overcrowded building, students often have a study hall in a room where a class is being held. They cannot possibly study the way they should. Also we could have a larger, more modern library with many up-to-date reference books. It would not have to be used as a classroom as it is now, preventing the use of it as a library.

Fourth, there would be more students in a larger school which would mean keener competition. Instead of able to teach the subject in which he specialized, there would be many striving to do good work. This would result in better work by the student and a higher scholastic standing for the school. So - more courses, more teachers, more and better equipment, and keener competition which would be found in a larger school would result in a fuller and more adequate education for the pupil.

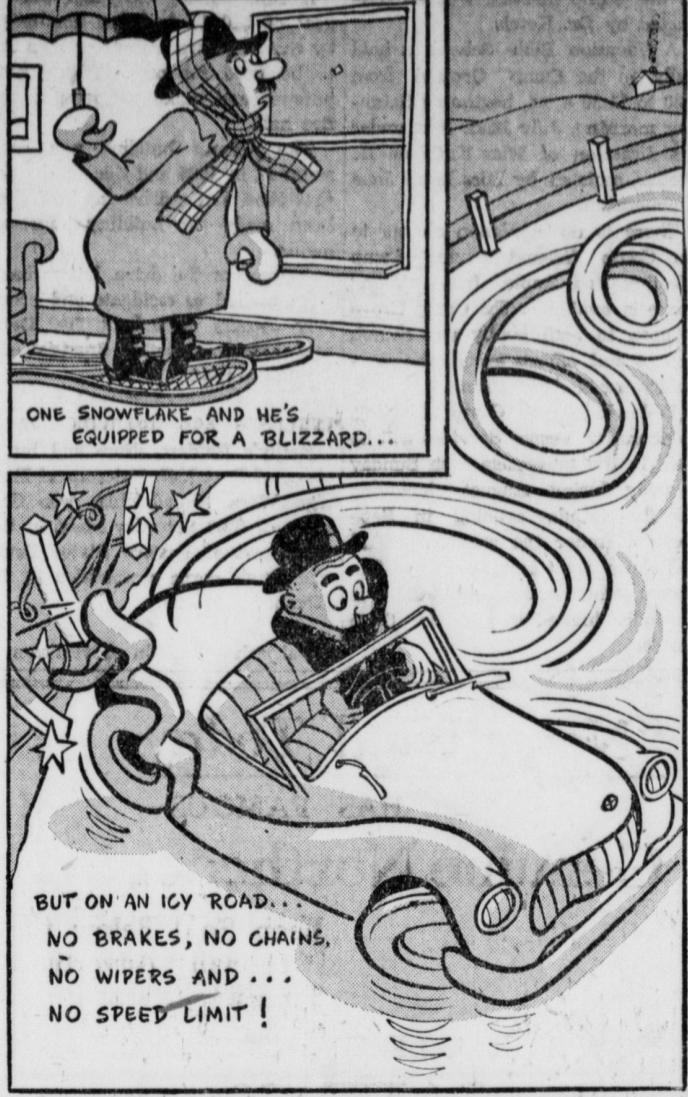
