TRUCK OVERWEIGHTS ARE NOW ALL-TIME HIGH

State Police arrests on truck overweight violations are running at an all-time high.
They're averaging about 2,500 a month since the 1949 Legislature increased the State Police force to 1,800. It had been 1,600 men.

The facilities include new weight scale installations on arterial roads throughout the state, another item set up by Pennsylvania lawmakers last year.
Prosecutions for driving overweight trucks are heavy in Lancaster County but no definite statistics are available. Portable scales operate out of the Lancaster barracks and there are many permanent weighing-in points to which police take trucks to be weighed.
Pennsylvania law prohibits a load of more than 45,000 pounds on commonly used trailer trucks under penalty of a \$50 fine.

Lee de Forest

SIXTEEN CONCRETE SILOS FOR STORING COCOA BEANS
Sixteen concrete silos, capable of storing 56,000,000 pounds of cocoa beans are being constructed by the Hershey Chocolate Corporation.
Since August 14, some 225 men have been pouring concrete 24 hours a day and work is scheduled to be completed in the next few days.
So unique has been the construction that it became necessary to call out State Police to direct tourists attracted to the scene. Police set aside Trinidad Avenue adjacent to the silos from which spectators can watch the construction.
Each silo is 30 feet in diameter and 130 feet high.
