A Benefit To Many ments to the Social Security Act. it is estimated that several hundred additional wage earners 65 years cattle in a field, a method quite of age or over in the area served by the Lancaster Social Security office are now eligible to receive monthly old-age and survivors insurance payments starting with September, the date on which this Mr. M. S. Gleaton, manager of the Lancaster Social Security Administration office announced today.

Mr. Gleaton stressed the fact that the new law provides that any wage earner who is now 65 years of age or who will be 65 before coverage" to qualify for monthly Social Security payments. A "quarter of coverage" is any three-month period beginning each January, April, July and October in which in employment covered under the quarters can have been earned any-time after January 1, 1937 when the
