AN EDUCATIONAL TOUR BY PIONEER REPRESENTATIVE

Mr. C. A. Ricedorf, this place returned yesterday from an educational tour sponsored by the Pioneer Corn Company. While on tour, he had an opportunity to visit and study the Pioneer research program near Yellow Springs, Ohio. This is one of the largest corn breeding research projects of its kind in the eastern corn belt.

The 20-acre plot is conducted by Ray Snyder, Pioneer corn breeder, who serves the eastern corn belt for the Pioneer company, and who has experimented on hundreds of new hybrid varieties under many different growing conditions for this area.

The past 10 years, breeding has been directed by the Pioneer company toward blight resistant varieties and many such varieties have been put on the market. Other varieties, not only resistant to blight, but to insect attacks and other growing hazards, have been perfected here with the growers at all times obtaining high yields in hybrids with the desired characteristics.

Mr. Ricedorf had an opportunity to observe hundreds of new hybrids in the making, giving him an idea of what can be expected in the corn growing future. Thousands of different inbreds have gone into perfecting desirable disease resistant varieties.

The testing plot visited by Mr. Ricedorf, is only one of many such plots located throughout the eastern corn belt. One of the most recent and remarkable discoveries of the experimentation has been Pioneer's development of a variety resistant to the weevil for farmers in the Southern corn belt.
