to appoint a representative from their group to act as judge during the Halloween parade. Council appointed Paul Stehman, Jr.

Arnold, Bricker and Beyer law firm advised Council that all papers are in order to turn over the water system to the boro authority. However the authority wants to set up its books before taking over and expects to be ready about November 1st.

Paul Stoner, of the Zoning commission, again presented his resignation from the commission and Council accepted.

Officer Neiss reported that he could have a room for an office in the Community Building, rent free with heat and light furnished. Some councilmen were of the opinion that the officer did not need an office. No action was taken.

Council signed an agreement to pay Maurice Bailey and Arthur Mayer \$50.00 a month for the rental of the scales to weigh trucks.

Mr. Paul Stehman, Sr., of the Zoning commission reported that the new commercial district along the Harrisburg pike is 200 ft. in depth. He also requested council to have a new tracing made of the Zoning map for use of the commission. Same would cost \$200. Council will consider.

Bids will be received for 2000 ft. of 6 in. bell and spigot cast iron pipe. Bids will be opened at the regular meeting of council November 6th.

The Community Exhibit was granted permission to use the lots on Delta and Henry Sts. for the show next week.

Supervisor Smetzer reported a proposed diner to be built on the new development along the Harrisburg pike had requested water. Councilman Hostetter advised Council that the diner idea has been dropped.

Burgess Zerphey turned over \$27.00 for peddlers licenses, parking fines and firearms permits.

Fred Fletcher, representing Columbia Avenue residents, requested certain proposed amendments to the Zoning laws. Same was referred to the boro solicitor before Council acts.

Treasurer Krall reported balances of \$17,226.17 in the boro account and \$21,151.36 in the water account.

Representatives of the Fire Company asked that the insurance on the fire truck be paid by the boro instead of the fire company. Council passed a motion to do so.

Police Chief Neiss reported sixteen auto prosecutions and 18 overweight trucks with 1,143 miles travelled by auto.

Bills paid from the boro account were \$341.88, from the water account \$577.88.

Checks were received as follows: \$485 auto fines in September from James Hockenberry, \$52.25 1948 taxes with \$1,596.16 outstanding, \$150.75 1949 taxes with \$4,062.61 outstanding, \$210.00 from the Union National Mount Joy Bank as interest due on securities, \$311.85 from George Brown, III, 1950 taxes collected with \$1,453.40 real estate outstanding and \$4,912.00 per capita outstanding, \$35.00 from Robert Brown for fines in August, \$35.00 from Zoning officer Walters for building permits issued during the month of September.

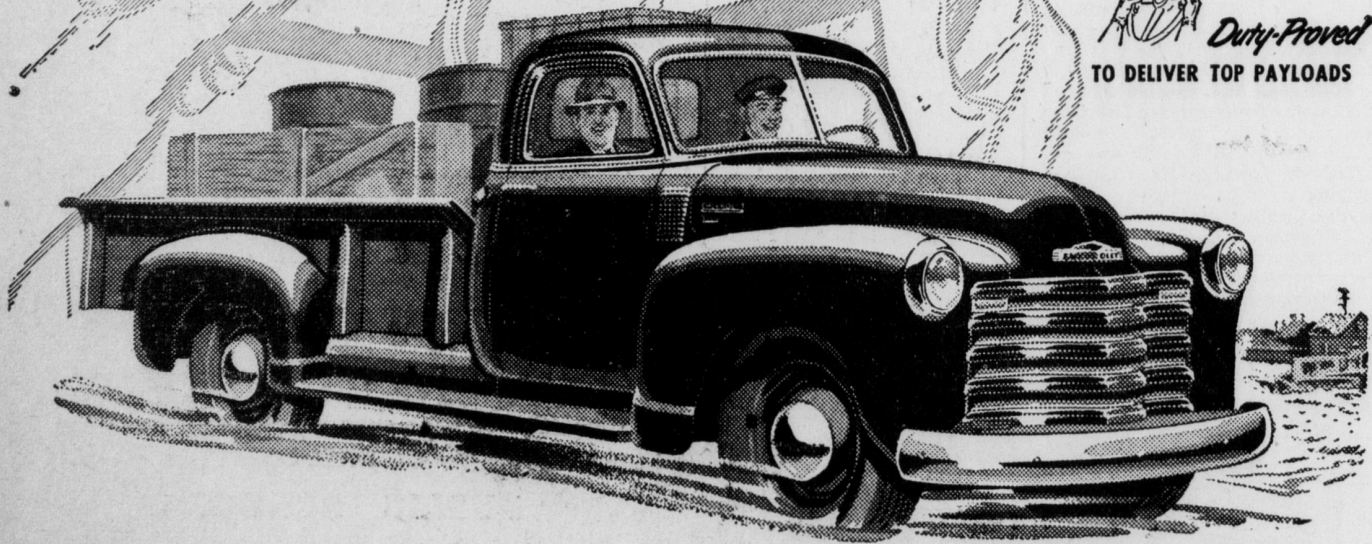
