Kauffman Keller Is Named Guided Missiles Chief

A decision to name a special guided missiles consultant as adviser to Secretary of Defense Marshall raised speculation that a major step-up in the program may

K. T. Keller, president of the Chrysler Corp., was disclosed to have been working with the armed forces on a special guided missiles study. The automobile firm said in a statement he will not sever his connections with Chrysler.

Defense officials who cannot be named said Keller was one of several persons being considered for appointment as a guided missiles consultant to Marshall. They did not name any others.

His appointment was made yes

The fact that Keller's extensiv experience has been in the field of industrial production brought speculation that the guided missiles program, which has high priority, is about ready to shift emphasis to and repairs on residential buildings output of weapons.
