(From page 1) about to begin after years of research.

Along this line the industrialist remarked that "the military importance of guided missiles is fully appreciated and the government feels the program should be expedited."

Keller said he has spent about three days a week in Washington since President Truman first approached him on the subject August 30.

Serving without salary or expenses, he said he probably would devote more time "when the program gets under way." He said Chrysler's board of directors had authorized him to devote as much time as he sees fit to the guided missile program, while continuing to hold his Chrysler post.

Keller said he has recommended a member of the armed forces to serve as his assistant. But he declined to identify him, saying he currently is employed on same "very important business."

BLANCH CELERY Blanching makes celery more tender and crisp. Blanching is growing the celery stalks for a short time in salted water or darkness. A simple way is to bank the soil around the stalks but not around the leaves.
