Weekly Letter By Penna. State Game Commission

Fourteen Counties Closed

Game officials have announced that as the result of legal petitions filed with the Pennsylvania Game Commission in compliance with law the following 14 counties will be closed to antlerless deer hunting this year: Bedford, Cameron, Centre, Clearfield, Clinton, Elk, Franklin, Fulton, Juniata, Mifflin, Perry, Pike, Snyder, and Sullivan.

Other counties presented petitions to prevent antlerless deer hunting within their boundaries, but only those listed above were successful in securing the required number of signatures. These closed counties will have no deer season until Wednesday, November 29, when male deer with two or more points to one antler may be taken.

IT Pays To Report Hunting Errors

Hunters who mistakenly kill a bird or animal not in season because it appeared to them to be legal game may pay only 25 percent of the penalty and go their way with a clear conscience, without danger of having their hunting licenses revoked.

All a sportsman must do is to remove the entrails of the animal killed in mistake and, within 24 hours, deliver the carcass to any State Game Protector, who will make a sworn statement describing how the bird or animal was killed in error.

Hunters who observe intentional or malicious violations of the game law will prove themselves good citizens and guardians of their future sport if they report illegal killing or property destruction to game officials.

That Standing Corn

Many farmers were compelled this year to wait for their corn to mature until after the beginning of small game season. They complain that some hunters seem unconcerned over the safety of persons working out of sight in standing corn.

It is the sentiment of agriculturists generally that inasmuch as they rear most of the farm game for gunners, all guests should show proper consideration for the welfare of their hosts by hunting outside of standing corn fields and generally conducting themselves in a safe and considerate manner.
