WE CAN'T IMAGINE

Taking systems of transportation and communication for granted it is hard to imagine what life would be like without postal and telephone facilities. In Korea they are finding out, as their minister of communication says, war's destruction has almost completely crippled postal and telephone communication. Maintenance of mail and phone service is vital to the administration of a country, to its economy. Think what the loss of it would mean to Mount Joy alone. In a single city it would be crippling, to an entire country it would be chaotic. It is for just such a reason that certain cities are redoubling their efforts for civil defense programs.

QUIET, PLEASE!

The battlegrounds of noise are the streets and highways. Some towns have laws to enforce anti-noise programs, but haven't enough officers to carry out the campaign effectively. Unnecessary horn honking by motorists follows you in town and country. A line forms for a stop light and someone in the rear of the line leans on the horn to get traffic moving. A crossroad carries a sign marked Stop, and the motorist back of you honks loudly before you have time to shift gears. A bridal party hysterically dines its way through town. The way we understand it, an auto horn is for an emergency and not to be used for a display of temper, of impatience, of exuberance, of emotional release. Let's have more quiet, please!

EARNING YOUR SECURITY

Using and disciplining ones inner resources of the mind's powers is true education, and for Education Week we quote a portion of an address made by General Eisenhower to the students of Columbia University:

"In these times when we hear so much of security, security for everything we do — when so many of us want to be sure that we shall never be cold, or hungry, or out in the rain, or have a leaky roof — I must tell you that you have come to the wrong place if you are seeking complete fulfillment of any ambition that deals with perfect security.

In fact, I am quite certain that the human being could not continue to exist if he had perfect security. Life is certainly worthwhile only if it represents struggle for worthy causes, and there is no struggle in perfect security. I should think that the best example of it would be a man serving a life-time in a federal prison."

HOW DO YOU STAND?

Cold facts, cold statistics are unpleasant if we choose to avoid an issue. It is statistics that put men to work and take them out of work, that increase or decrease the size of the pay check.

In this country there is need of 60 million jobs. The average investment made by business is \$8,000 to put one man to work and keep him working. This worker has his job as business produces and profits. The investment at stake is a gamble in the face of more cold facts, for example:

The average life of manufacturing concerns in this country is only seven years. Retail stores only seven and one-tenth years.

PP&L TO OFFER MORE SHARES OF COMMON STOCK

In a letter to all company holders of common stock, PP&L president, Charles E. Oakes, announced plans to carry out further company financing on or about December 1, by offering additional common shares to such stockholders. Under the company's charter, common stockholders of record have first option on the purchase of new common stock issued. To be offered pro rata, the new securities will be available to common stockholders on the basis of one share for each seven shares already held.

Subject to existence of favorable market conditions and to governmental authorization, the company will mail subscription warrants to holders of common stock, on or about December 1. Holders of record on or about November 30 will be eligible to subscribe, and it is anticipated that the subscription period will expire about 15 days after the mailing of the warrants. Subscription price and other terms and conditions relating to the offer have not yet been determined.

The company manufactures a complete line of dairy, horse and hog housing equipment; poultry and brooder house equipment; mammoth incubators; ventilating systems; electric barn cleaners; steel sash for farm buildings and grain bins. These lines are marketed under the trade name of Jamesway.

For the dairy farmer, Jamesway equipment has been engineered for almost every job. Feed trucks cut down the hours and effort of feeding, automatic water cups eliminate hauling water, electric ventilators do away with opening and closing windows and maintain even temperatures. A new type shuttle stroke barn cleaner was introduced to the trade a little over two years ago. This device reduces a stable cleaning job which takes one to two hours a day, 365 days a year, to an automatic operation whereby the work is done in a few minutes.

Equally important improvements in poultry raising have originated in James' Research Department. Metal poultry equipment produced by James has helped to increase egg laying substantially. James' incubators often hatch 90 per cent of eggs set and are easy to clean and disinfect. Pennsylvania, who has been president of the International Council of Religious Education since 1942.

The announcement reports that the Council, with its committees augmented by many local groups, is making extensive plans for the observance. This will include mass meetings in at least 3,000 communities in the United States and Canada. The completion of the Reviser Standard Version of the Bible will mark an epoch in the religious life of the English speaking peoples comparable to that marked by the issuance of the King James Version in 1611.
