NEW COMMON STOCK ISSUE AT \$23.00 TO PP&L STOCKHOLDERS

PP&L is offering to its common stockholders the right to subscribe, at \$23.00 per share, for 475,409 shares of additional common stock at the rate of one (1) share for each seven held of record November 28, 1950. The subscription warrants expire December 13, 1950. The offering is being underwritten by a group of underwriters headed by The First National Bank and Drexel & Company.

The company also will offer to each employee the privilege of subscribing to not more than 150 shares at the subscription price out of any unsubscribed shares. Common stockholders will have the privilege of subscribing for additional shares, subject to allotment, if there are any shares remaining after fulfilling orders from stockholder's primary subscription and from employees.

Proceeds from the sale of new common stock will be used in connection with the company's construction program. The company estimates that its construction expenditures for the 4½ years ending with 1954 will be around \$87,000,000. The company estimates on the basis of present conditions that, to complete the construction program, approximately \$25,000,000 in addition to the proceeds from this sale of securities. The balance, it's expected, will be obtained from treasury funds, cash generated from other internal sources. The company has made no statement as to when additional financing will be undertaken.

Earnings after all charges accruing to the common stock of Pennsylvania Power and Light Co., for the 12 months period ending Oct. 31, 1950 were \$9,394,983, equivalent to \$2.82 per share of common stock outstanding for end of the period. These net earnings reflect provision for Federal income taxes for the 9 months ended September 30, 1950 in accordance with the Revenue Act of 1950, and also a non-recurring reduction in income tax accruals equivalent to 15 cents per share on the common stock by reason of financing costs increased in the redemption of bond and debentures early this year.
