him to safety. The Sico derrick lifted out the car.

An auto driven by Ohmer Gingrich was stranded on the road leading from Mt. Joy to Newtown, in front of the home of Jacob Lindemuth. An effort was made to remove it with a tractor but it was unsuccessful. He made his escape in time. The car was removed when the water receded. The water in the Little Chickies creek at The Springs was as high as the iron bridge floor. At this point there was no damage.

Between here and Florin the macadam highway was covered and the water from this point east past the Farmers Inn and down to the creek resembled a lake.

The water was up to the Billow home on Fairview Street but no great damage was done.

At the Water Works
At the Boro pumping station the creek waters rose about the home of George Schatz, water works superintendent, who said he was preparing to move furniture to the second story when the creek rose but it was not necessary.

The Cove was also flooded, leaving only the roofs of the pavilions and chimneys of the outdoor fireplaces above water.

public schools, he worked in the flour milling business for his father south of Lancaster. Later he moved to Manheim and from there to Reading, where he was engaged in the handkerchief manufacturing business.

After several years he moved to New York City where he was engaged as a sewing machine mechanic for plants manufacturing handkerchiefs, pillow cases, art embroidery, etc. It was while he was thus engaged that he invented and had patented a needle threading and darning machine. These attachments for sewing machines were extensively manufactured and leased throughout this country and abroad. This patent and royalty netted the inventor quite a fortune. Later it was sold to the Singer Sewing Machine Company.

Mr. Eshelman then moved to Lancaster where he formed the Keystone Bag and Burlap Company, now operating on North Prince Street in that city. Later his son John J. acquired one half the business. The elder Mr. Eshelman was

president of the company at the time of his death.

His Gardens

Mr. Eshelman was a lover of nature and at his home 1057 Buchanan Avenue, he maintained one of the most beautiful formal gardens to be found anywhere.

Of late years he spent most of his spare time cultivating one of the finest vegetable gardens to be seen, not only thruout the county but in the state. His vegetables were the envy of many gardeners.

Loved the Outdoors

Mr. Eshelman was a great lover of outdoors. It was the writer's privilege and pleasure to hunt, fish, shoot targets and "live birds" with him thruout Canada and every state in the east from New York to Georgia.

He was quite a target shot and in his hey day ranked among the best. In 1917 he started shooting at the old Lancaster Gun Club of which he was secretary-treasurer for many years. Mr. Eshelman won many matches in many cities thruout the East. In 1922 he won the Mid-winter Handicap at Pinehurst, N. C. and kept on winning thruout the years. Only several years ago he won the Veterans Race, a national event, at Vandell, Ohio. Mr. Eshelman has one of the largest collections of trophies we have ever seen.

Club Affiliations

Deceased was one of the instigators and a charter member of the Amateur Trapshooting Association, organized at Vandell, Ohio, many years ago. This is a national organization of which he is an ex-president.

For many years he was one of the leaders in the Penna. State Sportsmen's Association, having served as president, secretary and treasurer at various times. He was also a member of the New York Athletic Club, the Roxboro Gun Club, the Quaker City Gun Club, both at Philadelphia. Also the Atlantic Indians and many other lesser organizations at the time of his death.

Mr. Eshelman was part owner of the former summer home, hunting and fishing lodge of the late Walter P. Chrysler, a tract of nearly 400 acres of farm land and several miles of water front known as Todd's Point, ten miles south of Cambridge, on the Eastern shore of Maryland.

The Family

His wife, the former Mary Hess, survives, with these children: John J., Dorothy Pauline, wife of Harold Graff, and Virginia M., wife of John Albert Eekman, all of Lancaster, as well as eight grandchildren and two great-grandchildren.

These brothers and sisters also survive: Frank E., Lancaster; Bertha C., wife of William Musser, Lampeter; Elmer J., Lititz; Pike; Susan Blanche, wife of Howard J. Hull, Lancaster; H. Roy, Lancaster; Howard J., Lancaster, and Violet, wife of George Hartman, Lampeter.

Funeral services were held from his late home Monday afternoon with interment at Conestoga Memorial Park.
