He was taken to St. Joseph's Hospital in a hospital ambulance. His condition was described as ser-

Oliver was traveling west on the highway behind a tractor-trailer driven in the same direction by William V. Johnson, twenty-four, Hartford, N. J., when he struck the rear of Johnson's truck, the State Policeman reported.

Poloncic said Johnson told him he was going about 30 miles per hour when he heard a crash and a horn blowing. The horn in Oliver's car was short-circuited in the crash and a small fire flared up. Johnson put out the fire with his extinguisher.
