your each other in their extreme hunger.

The Humane League agent immediately placed a cruelty to animals charge against Davis, who later pleaded guilty before Alderman David F. Rose and paid a \$20 fine and costs.

Broome said, however, that his interest in the situation was by no means at an end.
"I ordered Davis to buy hay, straw and feed today for those emaciated animals," he said, "and I intend going back there to see that it has been done."

The stable itself, he said, was fairly clean but there was no bedding except sawdust for the animals and no feed on the premises at all.

Broome said the animals were kept penned up in the stable and had the pigs been able to get out of the pen, they would have eaten a human being.

The crippled dog, he reported, tried to eat a stick while he and Madonna were there.
Broome said he was told that no feed truck had been seen on the premises for over seven months. The animals were apparently fed just enough to keep them alive and no more, he said.

Bones showed plainly through the hides of the cattle, and udders of the cows were shrunken from lack of food.

Broome estimated that 17 head of cattle would normally eat several tons of feed a month to maintain proper nourishment.
The Humane League agent said there was no question that the cruelty case was the worst he had ever encountered.

There have been worse single cases, perhaps, he said, but I have never seen so many animals abused by the same person.

Davis, he said, offered little excuse when confronted by him and Madonna. He said merely that he had been up against it and was not able to provide adequately for the animals.
Broome reported that Davis' farm is located about a mile and a half or two miles beyond Salunga. Davis himself lives in Landisville.
