**REV. PETER VARONOFF WILL SPEAK HERE SUNDAY**  
Rev. Peter Varonoff, of Odessa, will speak at the Calvary Bible Church on Sunday, February 18th, at 10:30 a. m. and on Friday, February 23rd, he will give a lecture with slides at 7:45 p. m.  
Rev. Varonoff, who has spent the most of his life in Russia, and whose parents are missionaries there, says that Communism has 3 elements: denial of God and the suppression of religion, abolition of private ownership of property, and hatred of the rich. Communism, he quotes, is power based upon force and limited by nothing. Some believe he says, that some day Lenin, the God of Godless, will return to life.  
The speaker also points out that in Moscow, a city of 8 million, there are only 30 churches, and that on Sunday as many as three separate services are held to give as many as possible an opportunity to worship. Stereopticon views of the city and of other scenes of interest in Russia, will be exhibited by the missionary.

A reception for 120 guests was held at Hostetter's Dining Hall here. After a wedding trip to Florida the couple will reside on a farm at Mt. Joy R1.

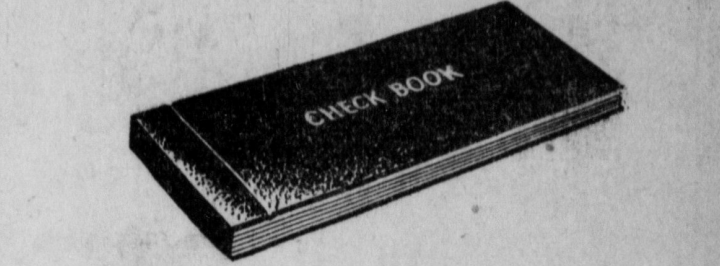
**WORLD SERVICE DAY-SUNDAY**

**GLAUCOMA MAY HIT DOG AFTER EMOTIONAL UPSET**  
Emotional upsets in dogs may lead to a serious eye disease known as glaucoma.  
The disease results in hardening of the eyeball due to pressure caused by an abnormal increase of fluids within the eye, and blindness may follow.  
Belief that emotional instability plays a part in the disease is founded on observations that glaucoma is more common in certain breeds of dogs and in certain individuals known to be highly excitable. A very exciting weekend may be instrumental in bringing on an attack of glaucoma.  
In some cases, forced rest and quiet are enough to return the dog's eye to normal in a day or two. In other cases, however, the wrought-up dog refuses to rest and aggravates itself into such a nervous condition that glaucoma symptoms develop.  
Glaucoma also may follow an infectious disease such as distemper or an injury to the eye, or it may be brought on by a continued state of poor health.

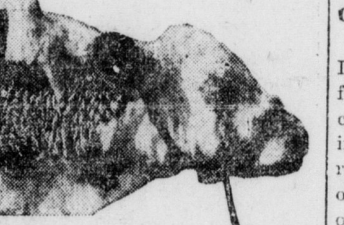

**NATIONWIDE ALERT FOR 'X' DISEASE'**  
Cattle raisers everywhere should on the alert this year for possible outbreaks of "X disease," the strange new malady that affects cattle of all ages but seems to be especially common among animals under 2 years old.  
"X disease" already has caused cattle losses in more than 20 states. In some of the worst outbreaks, as many as 81 per cent of the animals in affected herds have been stricken. Among diseased cattle, the death rate has been as high as 59 per cent.  
Just what causes "X disease," and how it is transmitted from one animal to another, no one yet knows. But extensive research investigations are being pointed up by the U. S. Bureau of Animal Industry and veterinary research leaders. In the meantime, veterinarians are isolating identified cases immediately and developing techniques to combat the disease.  
Symptoms usually include prolonged scouring, loss of appetite and weight, wart-like lumps in the mouth and on the tongue, and a scurfy hardening of the skin over the neck and shoulders.  
In diagnosing a suspected case, the veterinarian has to consider the entire pattern of symptoms. Otherwise, the disease may be confused with mange, virus scouring, or other ailments.  
A recent survey of several outbreaks indicated that newly-purchased cattle have served as carriers or, in some way, brought "X disease" into home herds. So authorities are warning farmers to be especially careful in purchasing feeder stock or breeding animals. A veterinary check-up of the newcomers seems to be a wise precaution.
