the advantages such as schools, roads and markets that it may offer. Another gain the community stands to make is the possibility of beginning adult evening classes. This, of course, would depend upon the desires of the people.

Possibly the greatest advantage that our community will hold will be the educational improvements. They are: A healthier environment, Better guidance and placement, More efficient teaching, Better school organization, Larger and well equipped band, Larger and better equipped orchestra, Enlarged commercial course, Improved vocational departments, Better athletic and health departments, Larger cafeteria and library, More and better clubs.

In addition to all the advantages already mentioned each student will have a chance, through the new school, to widen his range of social experience—the very thing which makes good citizens.

With the joining of the three schools more funds will be available for the many facilities such as musical instruments, athletic equipment and stage equipment, that are necessary to carry on an activities program successfully.

Another advantage will be that leadership in the various activities will be distributed so that no one student will be overburdened. The number of activities in which one student may participate as a leader will be limited either administratively or by competition.

The athletic program will probably be expanded to include football, soccer, and girls' hockey in the fall, boys' and girls' basketball during the winter months, and baseball and tennis in the spring. Also with additional space and facilities a more extensive intramural athletic program is possible.
