boro park, providing the boro paid the material. Council had asked for estimates and received the following: Approximate material cost of a 15x18 wading pool \$500. This was considered too small and now boro Council requested a price on a 20x30 ft. pond. Approximate material cost for a 40x60 playing area, \$600.

Aircraft Marine Products Inc., a new industry, paved part of Jacob and New streets. As previously agreed, the boro, Aircraft, and Mr. Amos Nolt would share the cost. The boro's third amounted to \$429.84. The reimbursement of Aircraft was authorized.

Oil and stone bids for the boro's 1951 requirements were received and awarded to Heisey Brothers Quarries, Rheems, at 16¢ per gal. for oil and \$1.80 a ton for stone.

The same firm was awarded the contract for the construction of School Lane, from bids received. The width of the street will be increased to 20 ft. The cost, \$1.40 per square yard.

An ordinance was passed vacating a portion of High street. It will be added to the Joy Company and Charles Latchford. By the same ordinance Council accepted Park Avenue.

The Fire Company went on record as not being in favor of paying \$2,000 toward the proposed addition to the fire house.

A letter from the Fire Company informed Council that Harry Resler had resigned as janitor. John Hendrix was employed in his place.

Councilman Newcomer reported that the State has completed its plans for improving Main street thru the boro and same is expected to be presented to Council at the next meeting.

Treasurer Carl Krall asked the Council's permission to sell boro securities to take care of a \$15,000 bond indebtedness due July 1st. A letter also stated that No. 2 bond for \$5,000 for the fire engine would be due July 1st. Mr. Krall also informed the group that No. 3 bond, a final note, could be paid any time after July 1st after giving the First National Bank and Trust Company 30 days notice and did they desire paying it off before maturity. He was instructed to notify the bank.

\$25.00 was paid as the boro's contribution to the Rams banquet. \$200 will be presented to the Centennial committee for the celebration and \$50 was appropriated to the Board of Health to meet expenses.

It was reported that Johnny Bloom, the soft pretzel man, has never paid a peddler's license in the 25 years he has been selling here. Burgess Fish informed him it was necessary but Bloom refused to comply. Fish asked Council's opinion and he was instructed to enforce the ordinance.

Chief of Police Neiss reported thirteen traffic violations, and 1,066 miles travelled last month.

C. Krall reported these bills paid: \$1,354.29 boro account and \$115.14 police pension annuity fund. Balance in the boro account \$11,128.10.

These checks were received: Robert Brown, \$125.00 March fines; \$100.00 April fines; James Hockenberry, \$425.00 April auto violations; Christ Walters, \$10.50 April building permits; George Brown II, \$212.00 for 1950 tax collected with \$283.10 for 1950 real estate and \$333.00 per capita outstanding. \$3,211.31 of 1951 taxes collected. Exonerated from collecting \$24 for 1950 per capita tax.

Charles Dillinger, secretary of the Board of Health, reported nine cases of measles, 1 mumps, 2 chicken pox, 3 nuisances being corrected and \$1 license fee.

Fire Chief Myers reported 1 call, rural, \$2,500 damage.

grow and to style beards, goatees, sideburns and other hairlike appendages or tufts of any kind and character within the limits of their ability, for the purpose of providing the approaching Centennial Celebration with proper atmosphere and color.

Arrangements have been made for the proper recognition of those individuals who, through civic pride and appreciation of their citizenship shall demonstrate the greatest degree of proficiency and originality in the development and care of the aforementioned hirsute adornments, and that suitable awards and prizes be distributed to those worthy of distinction.

Consequently those male citizens who refuse to take heed will be prosecuted. This persecution and ridicule shall be visited upon the heads of those who are clean shaven after May 11, 1951. They shall be prosecuted by a special court to be set up, to be known hereafter as the Mount Joy Kangaroo Court, and shall be staffed by a prosecution attorney, judge and as many policemen as needed.

The judgment of this court shall be final and no appeal to a higher court will be possible. And it shall be the duty of all females to become Sisters of the Swish and dress in period costumes or obtain a cosmetic permit. All residents of the town are expected to wear the official Robin Hood Centennial hat.

boro park, providing the boro paid the material. Council had asked for estimates and received the following: Approximate material cost of a 15x18 wading pool \$500. This was considered too small and now boro Council requested a price on a 20x30 ft. pond. Approximate material cost for a 40x60 playing area, \$600.

Aircraft Marine Products Inc., a new industry, paved part of Jacob and New streets. As previously agreed, the boro, Aircraft, and Mr. Amos Nolt would share the cost. The boro's third amounted to \$429.84. The reimbursement of Aircraft was authorized.

Oil and stone bids for the boro's 1951 requirements were received and awarded to Heisey Brothers Quarries, Rheems, at 16¢ per gal. for oil and \$1.80 a ton for stone.

The same firm was awarded the contract for the construction of School Lane, from bids received. The width of the street will be increased to 20 ft. The cost, \$1.40 per square yard.

An ordinance was passed vacating a portion of High street. It will be added to the Joy Company and Charles Latchford. By the same ordinance Council accepted Park Avenue.

The Fire Company went on record as not being in favor of paying \$2,000 toward the proposed addition to the fire house.

A letter from the Fire Company informed Council that Harry Resler had resigned as janitor. John Hendrix was employed in his place.

Councilman Newcomer reported that the State has completed its plans for improving Main street thru the boro and same is expected to be presented to Council at the next meeting.

Treasurer Carl Krall asked the Council's permission to sell boro securities to take care of a \$15,000 bond indebtedness due July 1st. A letter also stated that No. 2 bond for \$5,000 for the fire engine would be due July 1st. Mr. Krall also informed the group that No. 3 bond, a final note, could be paid any time after July 1st after giving the First National Bank and Trust Company 30 days notice and did they desire paying it off before maturity. He was instructed to notify the bank.

\$25.00 was paid as the boro's contribution to the Rams banquet. \$200 will be presented to the Centennial committee for the celebration and \$50 was appropriated to the Board of Health to meet expenses.

It was reported that Johnny Bloom, the soft pretzel man, has never paid a peddler's license in the 25 years he has been selling here. Burgess Fish informed him it was necessary but Bloom refused to comply. Fish asked Council's opinion and he was instructed to enforce the ordinance.

Chief of Police Neiss reported thirteen traffic violations, and 1,066 miles travelled last month.

C. Krall reported these bills paid: \$1,354.29 boro account and \$115.14 police pension annuity fund. Balance in the boro account \$11,128.10.

These checks were received: Robert Brown, \$125.00 March fines; \$100.00 April fines; James Hockenberry, \$425.00 April auto violations; Christ Walters, \$10.50 April building permits; George Brown II, \$212.00 for 1950 tax collected with \$283.10 for 1950 real estate and \$333.00 per capita outstanding. \$3,211.31 of 1951 taxes collected. Exonerated from collecting \$24 for 1950 per capita tax.

Charles Dillinger, secretary of the Board of Health, reported nine cases of measles, 1 mumps, 2 chicken pox, 3 nuisances being corrected and \$1 license fee.

Fire Chief Myers reported 1 call, rural, \$2,500 damage.
