TRUCK HITS TRAFFIC LIGHT

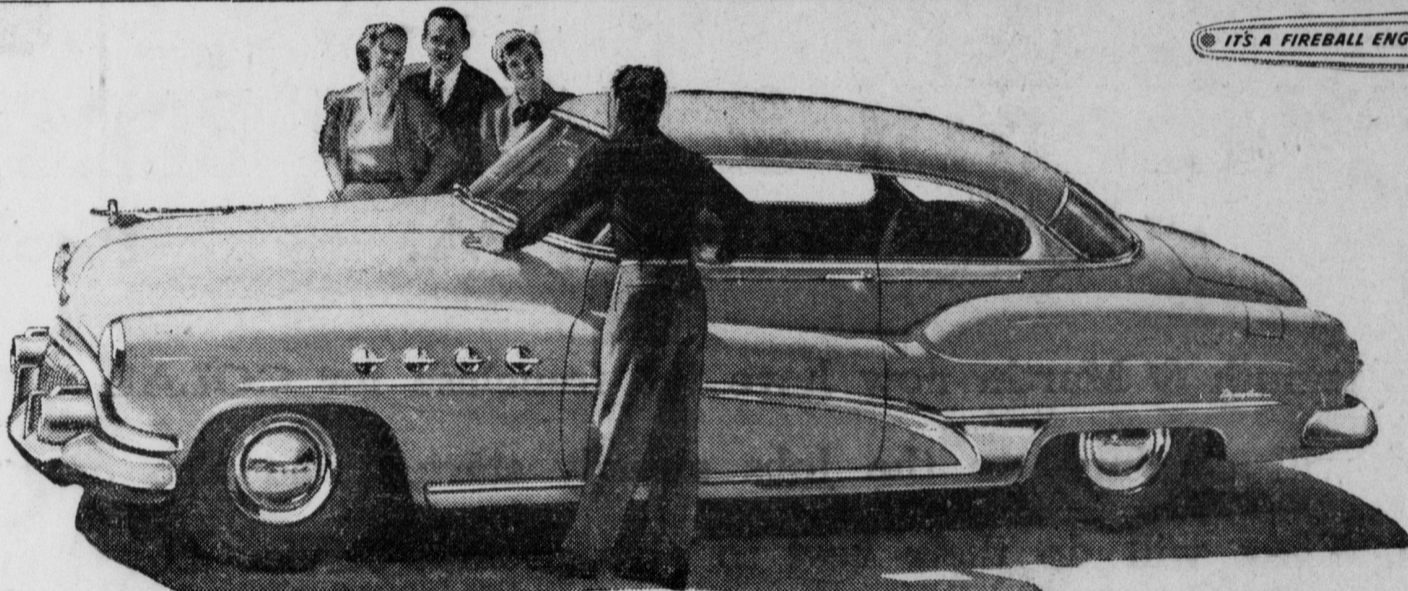
The traffic signal at the Washington House, corner W. Main and New Haven Sts., was badly damaged when struck by a cattle truck and will have to be replaced by a new one.

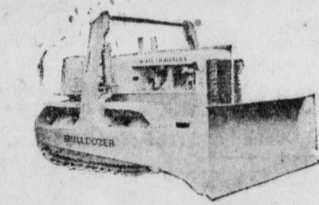
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
