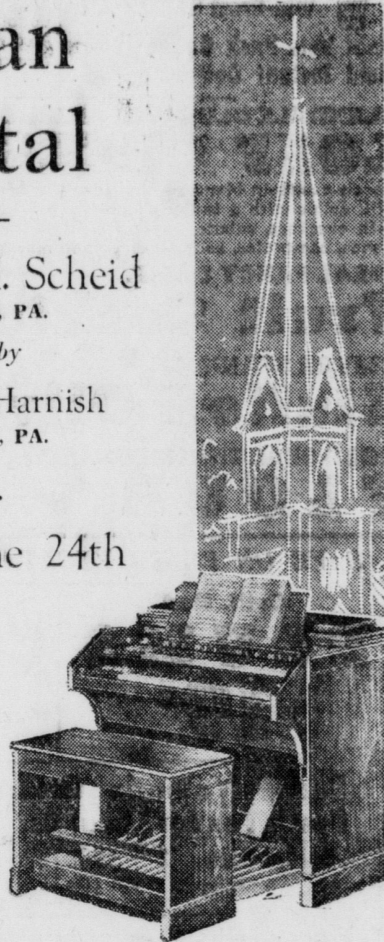

NEWSPRINT UP \$10 A TON, HIGHEST IN 30 YEARS

An increase of \$10 a ton by Abitibi, third largest of the big newsprint producers, sent newsprint to the highest price in nearly 30 years, another sock on the chin for newspaper publishers.

The boost brings the New York price to \$116 and the Canadian tag to \$112.

The new price compares with an all-time top of \$120 in the 20's and a low of about \$40 in the depression years. Prices for newsprint vary according to location but on a New York basis newsprint sold for \$50 in 1938-2 period; \$84 in 1946; \$90 in 1947; \$96 in mid-1948, and \$100 at the end of 1948.

A boost of \$6 a ton last Fall carried prices to the \$106 level.
