This instrument, used to measure the heat in hay stored in barns, is especially in demand at this season when hay crops are being harvest ed. Numerous barn fires are started by spontaneous combustion of the heat generated in piles of hay Workman Jr., as best man. and "taking the temperature" of a thay crop can prevent the loss of the barn, etc. When the reading of the thermometer shows a dangerous heat, the crop is removed before fire results.

Previously, when a farmer was not sure of his hay crop and wanted it tested, the local company had to loan a thermometer from Iron ville.
