Mr. and Mrs. Russell Sumpman, 128 Mt. Joy St., recently received a letter from their son, E. Lowell, in the U. S. Navy, informing them that he had met up with another local young man, of all places, in the middle of an ocean.

Lowell is an aviation boatswain mate, 3rd class, aboard the aircraft carrier, U.S.S. Boxer, now in service in the Korean theatre of war.

On June 22, Sumpman was returning from chow when he noticed a group of pilots on the hangar deck. One looked familiar and approaching him Sumpman recognized the pilot as Kenneth Ney, son of Mr. and Mrs. Chester Ney, formerly of town, now of Marietta R. D. After Sumpman identified himself, Ney inquired about his family, and the two had a great time until it was time for Ney to go out on a "hop".

The carrier Boxer is credited with 43,000 landings and Sumpman witnessed 15,000 of them. He informs us that Ney, a lieutenant (j.g.) is attached to the 35th aircraft composite squadron seeing active duty in Korea. In 1947 he made the 18,000th landing on the carrier deck and his name appears on the ship's plaque as having done so.

Neither young man was aware that another Mount Joyan was serving duty on the boxer.

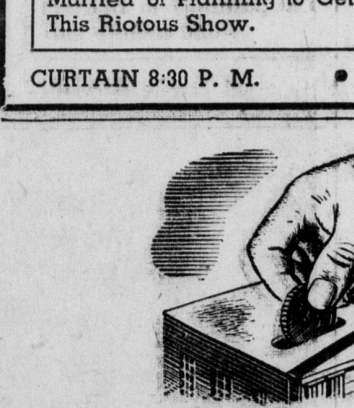
