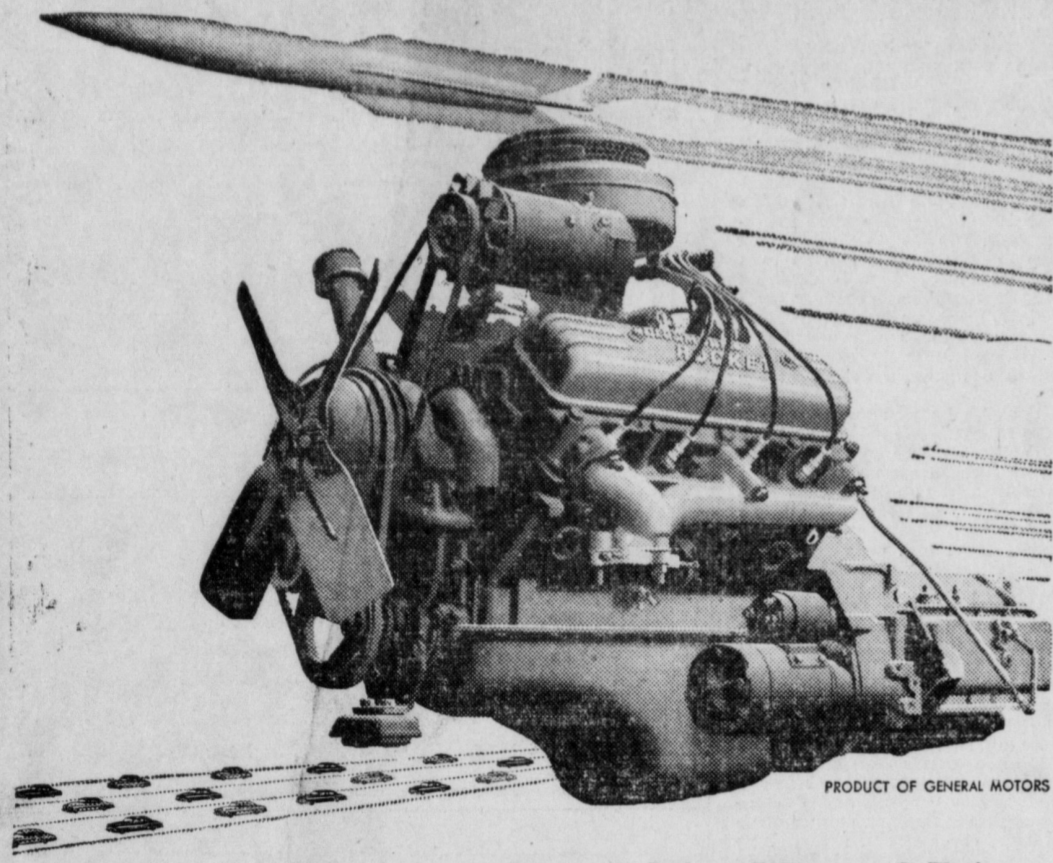

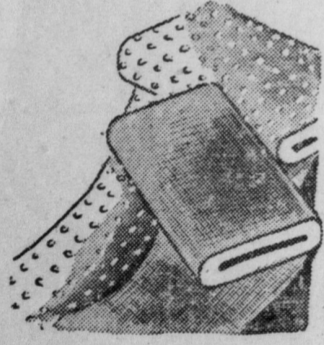

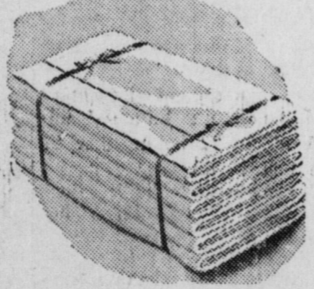

Summer Supper Suggestion

Creamed Tuna

1/2 cup Louella or Carnation Milk, diluted with 1/2 cup water

1 tablespoon Louella Butter

1 tsp flour

1/4 tsp salt

1 cup (7-oz can) tuna

Melt butter in saucepan over medium heat. Stir in flour and salt; cook 1 minute; remove from heat and add 1/2 cup milk; blend carefully until smooth. Add remaining milk and return to heat, stirring constantly until sauce thickens. Add tuna and serve immediately over toast, slices or browned noodles. Garnish with pimiento or sliced olives, if desired. Makes 4 to 6 servings.
