Handy Jim's FIX-UP TIPS

For Farm and Home

Unusual Serving Tray

An easy-to-make project is a serving tray. Two pieces of Masonite 1/2" Tempered Presdwood, glued together back-to-back, are required. The tray is 16 inches wide and 24 inches long. Ends should be rounded off to form the shape of a kidney.

At a distance of 3/4 inch from the edges, drill 3/16-inch holes, 1 inch on

centers. A piece of 3/8-inch rope, sufficiently long to go around the tray and allow arches at each end as handles; then is sewed in place through the holes. A strong cord and darning needle should be used.

The tray may be primed and painted or left in its natural color. In the latter case, the surface should be sealed with a clear penetrating sealer.

Don't Let Scrap Waste Away, Sell It to Aid Defense, Farmers Urged



Will steel output be increased? That depends to a great extent on whether farmers move their iron and steel scrap promptly, says the Committee on Iron and Steel Scrap of American Iron and Steel Institute.

Thousands of tons of scrap—idle in junk piles on farms, and some of it is wasting away, says the Committee. If farmers promptly sell this material to local scrap collectors, it will be moved to steel mills or foundries for the production of defense equipment and essential civilian items. All scrap is urgently needed—whether a few pounds, a few bushels or a ton or more.

Farmers will help themselves by the sale of the scrap and will help strengthen the United States. Each day about 2,000 carloads of purchased scrap are required by steel mills and foundries. The mills are operating at a record high rate and using more scrap than ever before.

Old tools, wornout parts of tractors, trucks, cultivators and other implements; broken and discarded pieces of metal and other scrap should be taken to town and sold right away to the local scrap dealer. Every pound of scrap which comes back to steel mills helps to make two pounds of new steel, on the average.

If the scrap is unusually bulky, preventing its easy transportation by the farmer, the scrap dealer can be called or the local farm agent can be asked to work out an arrangement.

"Farms are one of the big sources of scrap," says the Committee. "Never have farmers had a greater stake in the nation's steel output."

"More scrap from farms means more steel.

"This vital material must not be allowed to waste away. There is no place for waste in the United States today."

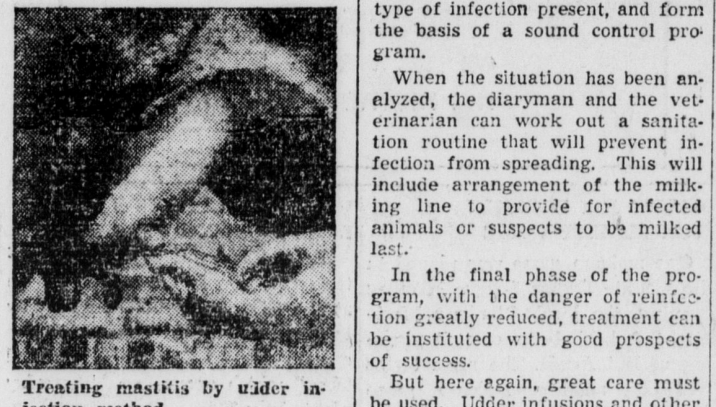

POSSIBLE TO RID HERD OF MASTITIS

Veterinarians say that a good half of the problems arising in dairy herds today are due to mastitis.

Yet, research has shown that a mastitis-free herd is within the range of any farmer. A sound mastitis control program comprises two



parts: 1. Proper management. 2. Treatment. Correct management is more important than treatment, because it helps PREVENT most mastitis cases.

Here are some common causes of mastitis: Teat and udder infection method.

But here again, great care must be used. Udder infections and other treatments should be regarded as delicate operations. They should be performed only by a person with special training and skill in their use. Remember, mastitis cannot be controlled by treatment alone. Good management must accompany good treatment.

What About Calf Scours?

Q: Just what is calf scours?

A: It means an inflammation of the intestines which results in scouring.

Q: Is calf scours always contagious?

A: No. Some types are due to improper feeding or overfeeding. However, "contagious" scours is often called white scours—is a quick-killing infection which may appear suddenly even with careful feeding.

Q: What causes contagious scours?

A: Generally a germ called "E. coli." However, a virus may be responsible for some outbreaks. Once the intestine is damaged many kinds of germs may cause complications, also pneumonia or kidney damage.

Q: What are best precautions against calf scours losses?

A: Be sure calves get first milk or colostrum. Avoid overfeeding. Provide clean quarters, ample ventilation and sunlight. Prevent calves from eating bedding. Use clean feeding buckets.

Q: What if an outbreak of scours appears?

A: Isolate sick calves and get a veterinarian immediately. He can recommend the proper control plan and treatment. This may involve use of serum, sulfa drugs or antibiotics. Don't guess.

Q: What about scouring in older calves?

A: Sometimes this is due to worms or to coccidia. A technical diagnosis is usually required to be sure of the cause.
