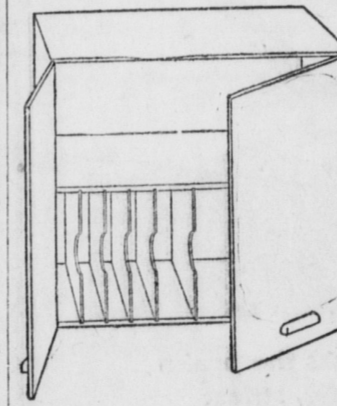

**Better Use of Space**

THE problem of making better use of large spaces in kitchen cabinets is a common one. One way to solve it is to add some dividers. The ones illustrated are easily installed and inexpensive. If the shelves are removable, take them out and cut saw grooves into which panels of Masonite 1/2-inch tempered



hardboard may be slid. A common alternative is to install commercially available metal moldings to serve as slides for the hardboard dividers. Note that circular segments are cut from the front edges of the dividers to provide easy access to each space. Homemakers will find the space useful for storing over-size platters, cookbooks, large shallow pans and other odd-size pieces of kitchen equipment.
