**PP & L Will File Tariff Increases**

As a result of continually rising prices on practically all items going into the cost of providing electric service, Pennsylvania Power & Light Company announced today it is filing tariff changes with the Pennsylvania Public Utility Commission to become effective on November 12, 1951, which will increase charges under certain of the electric rate schedules under which the large commercial, industrial and resale customers are served.

Mr. G. T. Storb, Lancaster division vice president, said that residential, farm and small commercial customers are not affected by this filing. "The company," Mr. Storb added, "is also including with these changes a new and lower fuel adjustment clause to replace the two fuel adjustment clauses presently in effect. While this new lower fuel clause partially offsets the coincident increase in rate charges, the net result is some increase in the total charges to the customer. Compared to the very substantial increases which have already taken place in the price of all other commodities, this increase in rates for large power users can be considered as a very modest one. In the past decade the cost of providing electric service has mounted rapidly—wage rates have doubled, the prices of materials and equipment have likewise pushed upward and the cost of constructing more and more facilities to meet customers' expanding use has advanced rapidly. The inflationary effect has been compounded by mounting taxes and the result has been to make existing power rates inadequate to support the burden."

Mr. Storb explained, "The company has employed every means possible of effecting economies in all phases of its operations, but continually increasing costs have more than offset the effects of these savings. Viewed in the light of the drastic changes which have taken place, the proportionately small advance made in electric power rates is a noteworthy achievement. Electricity still remains the customer's biggest bargain."

"The increase in revenue the company will realize from the increased charges will have an important bearing on the utility's ability to maintain, improve and expand its facilities in Central Eastern Pennsylvania to meet steadily mounting demands of our growing population, the increasing needs of industry and agriculture plus the additional requirements for military preparedness."

"The tariff changes, affecting those electric customers served under schedules GLP-3 4 and 5, B-4, B-5, B-6, B-8B, B-17B, IC-5B, IC-4B, P-7ICMT-2, P-84ERY-2, P-85CMT, P-97ST-4, P-102RES & P-102RES-3, will be available at the company's office," Mr. Storb said, "and the company is calling on all of its customers who are affected by these rate changes to explain the individual effect of the new rates on their service bills."
