Were Injured In Auto Accidents In This Locality

These auto accidents occurred throughout this locality during the past week:

Auto Hit a Pole Andrew B. Hess, eighteen, Mount Joy R1, escaped injury at 1:15 a. m. Sunday when his car struck a telephone pole on Butter Road, near Eden.

State Police reported Hess was driving north on Butter Road and went off the road, striking the pole. Damage was estimated at about \$350.

The injured woman was treated at the scene of the accident by Dr. Michael Gertch, Bainbridge, for lacerations and bruises about the face, body and arms.

Charles E. Anderson, Bainbridge, driver of the fire truck, told State Policeman Walter Miller, that the woman tried to pass the apparatus. He said her car left the highway, bounced back and struck a pole, and then hit the end of the fire truck.

The fire truck was towed from the scene. It was being used to haul water from King's run, near Falmouth, to fill cisterns around Bainbridge.

Fluoridation Of Water Approved At Landisville

A consumer poll, proving sentiment six to one in favor of the project, will result in fluoridation of the water supply for Salunga and Landisville, the East Hempfield Twp. Municipal Authority has announced.

The two communities will be the first in Lancaster County to take this step in an effort to minimize tooth decay among children. The only three Pennsylvania communities known to be using the "treated water" at this time are Ford City, Brookville and Evansville. Easton also has filed an application for approval of a similar installation.

Jesse E. Snavey Jr., chairman of the authority, said the bids soon would be sought for the Salunga-Landisville installation. By means of a mail poll, he said the authority determined that two-thirds of its total of 414 metered customers were interested enough to voice an opinion on fluoridation, and this opinion ran six to one in favor of the project.

Consumers were advised that the extra cost of the fluoridation treatment would add about \$1 a year to their individual bills.

Fluoridation has been recommended for Lancaster City's water supply, by the Board of Health and professional groups, but local plans are still in the discussion stage.

POST CARD WILL COST 2 CENTS AFTER FEBRUARY 1

President Truman yesterday signed the postal rate increase bill which dooms the penny post card as a part of a \$117 million annual boost in postal charges.

The new two-cent rate on post cards goes into effect next February 1st.

In addition, there will be a 10 percent boost in mailing charges for newspapers and magazines April 1 next year. Two other 10 percent increases on this type of mail will take effect April 1, 1953, and April 1, 1954, making a 30 percent hike in all.
