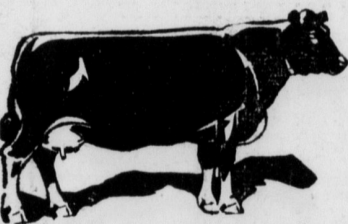

Some rural patrons have letter boxes on the wrong side of the road as compared to the way the rural carrier travels. Some have been notified and have been asked to move them. If you have not done this as yet, will you give this matter your kind attention.

By cooperating you will not only benefit the carrier who serves you, and desires to give you the best service, but it will help you in that the carrier will make better time and you will receive your mail earlier.

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By Assisting Post Office & Carriers You Help Yourself

With Christmas just a short distance away, naturally our thoughts turn to various items of importance that effect the post office and you.

Among some of the important items of course is the additional help that is needed during the rush period, which will be from December 15 to December 27 inclusive. Persons desiring to work during this time as temporary help are to get in touch with me at the Post Office. Of course preference is given to veterans over non veterans. The work and also helping the town carriers, will consist of helping in the office.

If you are interested come to the Office and receive an application from the Postmaster, fill it in and return it to the office.

There are a few things that are of benefit to you the public. First one is to be sure your mail matter has the correct amount o postage and above all the correct address.

The rate is still 2c for unsealed and 3c for sealed. In sending parcels, Be Sure they are tied securely, addressed correctly and that your return address appears in the upper left hand corner of the parcel. These are all important things and besides helping the clerk in the office, you can feel more sure that your parcel will arrive at its destination in fine shape. Another item that will save you time is to buy your stamps in advance, and this will save you standing in line and waiting. The windows are open daily from 8 to 6 p.m. and Saturday from 8 to 12 noon.
