New Super-Carrier Forrestal Adds Punch to Navy's Power

The new super-carrier, the James V. Forrestal, will be the Navy's contribution to the formula of striking power plus mobility which is the essence of American military strength today," says Major George Fielding Eliot.

The huge floating air base, which will take three years to build and will cost \$218 million, is the logical result of the development of the aircraft which it serves, according to Major Eliot. The flight decks of modern carriers have had to be increased in size to take care of the high landing speeds and larger size of jet propelled aircraft.

A carrier is concentrated power. The visitor who goes aboard such a ship for the first time gets an initial impression of utter confusion compounded by enormous size. There thousands of officers and men or thereabouts busily perform hundreds of highly specialized tasks involving almost every conceivable mechanical, electrical and technical specialty.

Up top, the flight deck is some 3 1/2 acres of plank-sheathed steel. According to Major Eliot, an airfield on land would require something like 140 acres to handle aircraft of the number, size, and characteristics which a big carrier must handle.

The vast, echoing gloom of the hangar deck below may remind one of Mammoth Cave—and compares with it in height and width. Down below are turbines which develop the more than a quarter of a million horsepower required to drive the great carrier through surging seas at express train speed.

Taming the Titan

Chemical and metallurgical engineers in laboratories all over the country are grappling with the intriguing and exasperating problems involved in the use of titanium as an engineering metal. This "new" material was actually discovered as a chemical element in the year that George Washington was inaugurated first president of the United States; but its peculiar characteristics—especially its reluctance to separate in pure form from its ores—have prevented it, until lately, from being exploited.

Now titanium's days as a laboratory curiosity are over. Military engineers see in its combination of strength-with-lightness an opportunity to improve substantially the mobility and transportability of combat equipment. Aeronautical engineers anticipate that, when all feasible application of titanium alloys are made, the weight of heavy planes can be reduced by from one to five tons.

Sink Stains

Most stains on the sink can be removed with a mild abrasive. Rust stains are best removed by treating with an acid. Vinegar or lemon juice may be used, but dilute hydrochloric acid is more effective. A bleaching solution, such as Javelle water, is also quite effective in removing general stains from porcelain. It is more difficult to remove stains from the tray, since the color tends to penetrate into the plastic.

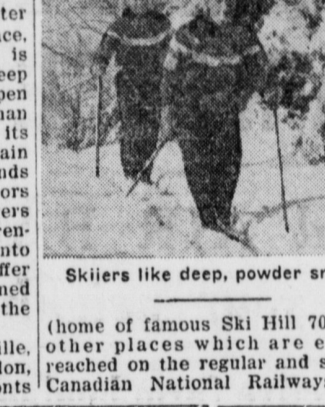

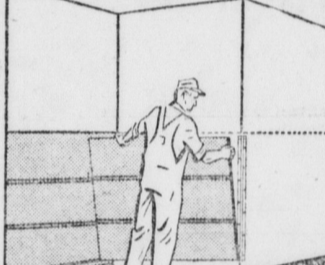

Pre-Finished Wall Panels

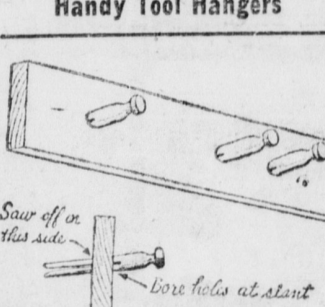
HOME building and remodeling have been greatly simplified by the application of pre-finished wall panels. Made primarily of Masonite tempered hardboard, the panels have various finishes giving a wide range of surface treatments including many wood grain patterns and various scoring patterns. Beautiful pastel colors as well as striking deep tone colors are available. Combinations incorporated in the scored panels form a variety of color schemes to fit into any decor. Grained panels have



been used effectively in every room of the home. The pre-finished panels may be used as wainscots and from floor to ceiling. The colored panels, both plain and scored, are most popular in kitchen, bathroom, laundry and utility rooms where their durable, lustrous surface will withstand hard abuse and repeated washings.

Pre-finished panels are one-eighth of an inch thick and are generally available in lengths of 4, 5, 6, 8 and 12 feet, and in a standard width of 4 feet. They are widely used not only in homes but in stores and institutions because of their beautiful appearance, their resistance to abrasions and stains, their reasonable cost and simple installation. Directions for installing pre-finished wall panels come with the bundles of material supplied by the score of manufacturers that use Masonite tempered hardboard as a base. Panels may be applied over a solid backing of smooth plaster, hardboard, wallboard, plasterboard, insulation board, wood sheathing or plywood.
