## Demonstration On Ways Of Using Kitchen Space

The efficient use of kitchens will be the subject of a demonstration meeting to be held in the auditorium of the Greist Building, Thursday evening, 8:00 o'clock, January 10th.

Miss Sanna Black, Home Management Specialist of the Extension Service of the Pennsylvania State College will be the speaker. The meeting is sponsored by the Lancaster County Agricultural Extension Service and is being planned by Miss Yvonne L. Cook and Miss Jean C. Weand, Home Economics Representatives.

Miss Black will demonstrate ways of using kitchen storage space effectively. These will include some simple changes which will be comparatively inexpensive. Often there are ways of rearranging equipment, both large and small, which will cut down the amount of time and energy used in the kitchen.

The efficiency experts have been working with business for many years, but the homemaker has often neglected opportunities to make her work easier. Sometimes a little re-arranging in the kitchen may save several hours a week. Time and energy are valuable and should be spent wisely. The kitchen is the homemaker's work-shop and it is the obligation of the family to make it as efficient as possible.

Often times simple carpentry work is involved and since this is usually the job of the man of the house, they are also invited to attend this meeting. The meeting is open to the public without charge and any one who wishes to attend is invited.

## Atomic Cemeteries at Sea For Radioactive Wastes

The possibility of public exposure to radiation from radioactive wastes in the new atomic age is "an ever-present danger" which is being given increased attention by insurance safety engineers, the Association of Casualty and Surety Companies declared in a special report reviewing methods of disposing of radioactive materials in industrial wastes.

Burial at sea in concrete-filled "coffins" in the gangster mode of prohibition days, has become one of the safest ways of getting rid of dangerous concentrations of radioactive wastes, the report pointed out. Concentrated liquid wastes from "hot" laboratories, where larger amounts of more highly radioactive materials are handled, are mixed with cement in oil drums and dumped in the sea 100 miles offshore.

The concrete-filled "coffins" also are buried deep in the earth, usually 12 feet down, in isolated "atomic cemeteries." These burial grounds are fenced in and posted as contaminated to prevent trespassing. As an extra safeguard, the radioactive burial pits and surrounding areas are monitored regularly with Geiger counters to check radiation.

While the Atomic Energy Commission exercises rigid control over these and other highly radioactive wastes from plants producing isotopes to prevent dangerous exposures, the disposal of relatively weaker wastes from hospitals, laboratories and some industrial plants using radioisotopes in research, "tracer" experiments and medical treatment is "only loosely supervised now and is not directly under the jurisdiction of the A.E.C.," according to the Special Hazards Committee of the Association's accident prevention department.

## Patent Laws

In the light of contemplated legislation affecting our patent law, it is well to consider the foresight of our founding fathers in providing for the rights of our inventors. This consideration began with the meeting of the framers of the Constitution of the United States in Philadelphia, May 14, 1787. A clause concerning patents and copyrights was adopted by the Convention on September 5. This provision was included in article I, section 8: "Congress shall have the power... to promote the progress of science and useful arts by securing for limited times to authors and inventors the exclusive right to their respective writings and inventions." President George Washington signed the bill for the patent law on April 10, 1790. By mid-May 1951, the Official Gazette of the Patent Office reports 2,552,507 patents granted—a rich reward for the wisdom of those early statesmen in providing this country with the first patent law in history to give the inventor intrinsic right to profit from his invention.

A reception was held at Hostetter's Banquet Hall here after which the couple left for Florida on a wedding trip. They will reside on the Fruitville pike near Manheim.

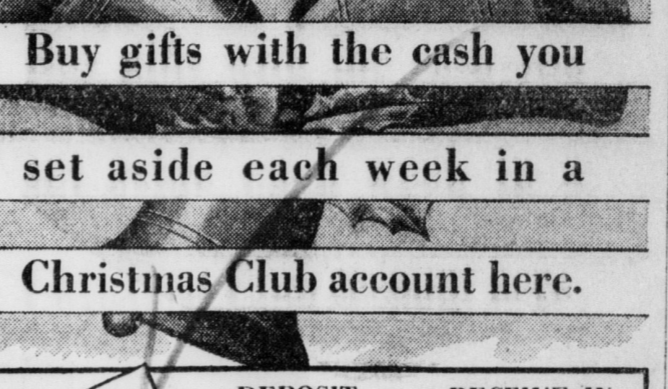
The bride is employed by the Pennsylvania Power and Light Co. and the bridegroom is in his father's grocery store at Manheim.
