TRAVEL EXPENSE
How much per day does it cost to travel? E. W. Howe went around

the world by ship in 1913 and a constant traveler told him that his own expenses, afloat and ashore, averaged \$11 a day. Howe made a calculation and found that his trip also cost him \$11 a day.

My cruise to Iceland last year cost a good \$50 a day, and many of the passengers paid two and three times as much. If one flew to Europe the price of the one day's flight would be about \$100. If one went by freighter the price might be less than \$10 a day.

Time is an important factor in cost. Few can leave their jobs for more than two or three weeks. Hence they try to do in a couple of weeks what should be spread over a couple of months. We triple the expense per day and exhaust ourselves and have little to show on our return except a few hideous souvenirs.

Then we have the automobile and trailer travelers. They may not travel as far and as a rule many travel inexpensive by car but what they lack in distance is offset many many times in interest. Stop whenever and wherever you choose and stay as long as you like.

When the local trolley line was abandoned twenty years ago, The Bulletin in its issue of Feb. 10 contained a lengthy article, suggesting the boro take over the trolley line and open a street from Longenecker Road west. The suggestion was made in order to improve access for our rural folks on the south and east.

Not so today as it is a part of the Noll farm, while the stretch from Longenecker road to proposed South Jacob street is owned by the writer.
